## Inauguration Of Dr. S. J. Wright As Fisk President Will Be Staged April 26, 1958

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—Dr. Stephen J. Wright, new president of Fisk University, will be inaugurated April 26, 1958. The inaugural date was set by the Fisk University Board of Trustees at a meeting in New York last week.

The inauguration will occur during the annual Fisk Spring Festival of Music and Art.

Appointed to serve as members of the Inauguration Committee were Mrs. Bernard Fensterwald, a member of the Board of Trustees from Nashville; Dr. G. Wallace Woodworth, a trustee and professor of music at Harvard University; and Fisk's Dean of the college, Dr. George N. Redd. Dr. Wright will serve as an ex-officio member of the committee.

Former president of Bluefield State College, Bluefield, W. Va., Dr. Wright, 46, is a native of Dillon, S. C., and has had wide training and experience in the educational field. He was for eight years professor of education and dean of the faculty at Hampton Institute. He has also held administrative posts at North Carolina College in Durham and in the public schools of Centerville and Upper Marlboro, Maryland.

Dr. Wright, who holds the Ph. D. degree from New York University, is a former president of the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools for Negroes and of the Alpha Kappa Mu honor society. He assumed his duties as President of Fisk in July.
