## Rapist Confesses Fatal Beating, 40 Attacks

CHICAGO (AP) — A recent Negro migrant from Greenwood, Miss., last week confessed the fatal beating of a Chicago woman and admitted the rape or attempted rape of about 40 others in a crime spree here recently.

He is Walter Montgomery, 20-year-old unemployed laundry worker, whom police said admitted to beating to death Mrs. Susan Turner, 37, in a southside alley when she tried

to resist his attempts to rape her. Mrs. Turner was assaulted last July 4 and died the next day.

Meanwhile, police disclosed that Montgomery is being questioned about the stabbing of another woman, Miss Oleta Elliott, 35, in front of her home last Aug. 24. A man answering Montgomery's description was seen fleeing the scene of the crime.

NEW YORK — The choirs of Morehouse and Clark Colleges, two United Negro College Fund members located in Atlanta, Ga., will be among those heard during the month of November on the American Broadcasting Network weekly radio series.

The broadcast schedule for the United Negro College Fund choral groups for November follows: Nov. 3, the choir of Morehouse College, directed by Wendell Whalum; Nov. 10, the choir of Clark College, Nashville, Tenn., under the direction of Harry von Bergen; Nov. 17, the Philharmonic Society of Clark College; and Nov. 24, the choir of Xavier University, New Orleans, La., under the direction of James Vestadt.

The programs originate from New York, Sunday, over WABC, 10:35-11:00 a.m., and are heard at varying local times throughout the United States and Canada. They are also heard overseas through the facilities of the "Voice of America."

The series features the choirs of the member colleges of the United Negro College Fund. Milton Cross, famed commentator for the Metropolitan Opera of the city of New York, is the narrator of the programs.
