

Shaw Whips Bluefield, 33-20; Falcons Lose To Rams

Counts, Hammonds, Hunter Standout For Shaw Bears

The Bears of Shaw University walloped Bluefield State Teachers College, 33-20, at Chavis Park here last Saturday before hundreds of spectators.

Bluefield's Big Blues narrowed the final margin twice in the final period after the Bears had racked up a 33-7 lead in the first three quarters.

Eugene Hammonds, halfback for Shaw, began the scoring for the winners, going over from the 1 to climax a 44-yard drive. On the first play of the second period, Donald Counts scored 50 yards for the locals' second touchdown.

The home team stretched the lead to 21-0 on a two-yard smash by fullback Leverage Hunter. The visitors broke into the scoring column before halftime on a 33-yard pass play from Merchant to Walters.

Both of Shaw's third period touchdowns came on long plays. Don Counts went 33 yards after receiving a short pass from Garvin and Hammonds scored 50 yards.

Leander Howard and Jim Hamilton scored on short plunges for Bluefield in the last quarter to climax drive of the victor, ymarked the Bears

Atlanta Sports Group Sets Day For 23rd Jamboree

ATLANTA, Ga. — The 100 Per Cent Wrong Club of the Atlanta Daily World will hold its 23rd annual All-Sports Jamboree here next January 31, according to an announcement released this week by A. L. Thompson, the club's president.

For twenty-three years, the Atlanta sports group, a unit of the Atlanta Daily World, has annually honored persons excelling in athletics or making outstanding contributions to the field of sports. In the past, Branch Rickey, Jackie Robinson, Pee Wee Reese, Floyd Patterson, Ray Robinson, Willie Galimore and others have been cited by the organization.

In 1957, the club honored persons having participated in the 1956 Melbourne Olympics with Miss Mildred McDaniel, Tuskegee, track star, sharing top honors with Floyd Patterson, who was named male athlete of the year. Lee Calhoun, N. C. College at Durham, and the women's track team of Tennessee A. and I. State University, were also top honorees.

An annual feature of the club's events is the awarding of national championship trophies to the intercollegiate football champions of the previous year. A huge trophy, donated by The Coca-Cola Company in memory of W. A. Scott, II, late founder and publisher of the Atlanta Daily World, is awarded the winning team.

Marion E. Jackson, World sports editor and coordinator of the sports promotion points out that the club's 1958 awards will be announced at a special press conference to be held at Miami, Florida, after the Orange Blossom Classic, December 14.

Ralph Dupas' White Status Upheld By Louisiana Court

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The long, arduous struggle by light-weight contender Ralph Dupas to live and fight as a white man in Louisiana last week culminated in victory for the fight in Civil Court here.

Judge Rene A. Vioves, declaring that prevailing testimony has convinced him that Dupas is white, ordered the New Orleans Health Department to issue the boxer a birth certificate as such. Dupas had filed suit in Judge Vioves's court, asking that the health department be forced to issue him a white man's birth certificate.

Dupas' race status was contested when Mrs. Loretta Gravolet, former registrar of births for neighboring Plaquemine Parish, testified before the Louisiana State Athletic Commission that she had registered the fighter as a Negro. The athletic body later cleared Dupas of the charge but legally the matter hung in the balance in the courts until last week.

If the judge had denied Dupas the white certificate, he would not have been allowed to fight white boxers in the state. Louisiana has a segregation law forbidding mixed bouts.

Dupas is the No. 3 contender for title honors.

FRANKFORD, Ky. (AP) — Inspired by the sensational success of Willie Galimore with the Chicago Bears this season, pro football teams are taking a closer scrutiny than ever of talent at fan colleges.

Winston-Salem Defeats Raleigh College, 14-13

St. Augustine's College's Falcons went down in defeat Saturday night as the Rams of Winston-Salem Teachers College racked up a slim 14-13 victory at Chavis Park.

Both clubs were scoreless in the first period, but in the second stanza Donald Thompson of the Falcons' team ran into the end zone for the first touchdown. The kick for the extra point was good.

Robert Love caught a pass for a Winston-Salem touchdown in the first few minutes of the third quarter. Fullback Benjamin Dupree made the extra point and later Dupree recovered on a kick for a second Ram touchdown. The extra

point was also made by Dupree.

Jesse Leucious, St. Augustine's back, carried the ball on a pass from A. C. Eldridge, to the Winston-Salem eight-yard-line in the final period. Russell then took it to the visitors' seven-yard-line and Eldridge carried it to the 1, but the ball was lost.

The locals continued to keep the ball near the Rams' end zone, and the last touchdown came in the final minutes of play as Eldridge handed the ball to Thompson from the Rams' 5 and Thompson went over the goal line.

Brown To Box Joe Lopes For Championship

CHICAGO (AP) — Joe Brown will make the third defense of his lightweight title against Joe Lopes of California here Dec. 4, Truman Gibson, International Boxing Club secretary announced last week.

Gibson said Brown has agreed to meet Lopes, who extended him in a non-title bout here recently, in the 15-round championship match that will be televised nationally under IBC auspices.

The fight will mark the first world 135 pound title event presented in the "Windy City" since Oct. 15, 1952, when James Carter defeated Laure Salas to regain the title.

Also, the only other championship fight held here this year was the one in which Sugar Ray Robinson knocked out Gene Fullmer to regain the middleweight title.

Brown won the lightweight title from Wallace (Bud) Smith in a New Orleans bout, successfully defended it in a rematch with Smith, and then went on to chill Orlando Zulueta in his second defense.

Brown and Lopes met in a 10-round here a few weeks ago and the champ barely won the decision. At that time, Lopes' handlers hollered long and hard for a title match.



Hockey Ace Back From Armed Forces

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Art Derrington, high-scoring ace of the Philadelphia Ramblers hockey team is returning to the ice wars after serving a hitch with the U.S. Armed Forces, overseas.

The top line duo made headlines with the Ramblers with his skating wizardry during the 1955-56 season, is returning to Philadelphia and the team Nov. 15, according to George L. Davis Jr., president of the Club. Davis said Derrington called him from Germany where he is stationed to confirm reports that he will soon be discharged.

The return of Derrington is good news both to the Ramblers front office and hockey fans throughout the area. A veteran of five years in the Eastern Hockey League, Derrington in the 1955-56 campaign led the team in total points and in goals scored, netting 33 goals and 1 providing 28 assists, for a grand total of 61 points in 49 games.

However, his best hockey year was in 1954-55, when he led the International League with 68 points — ere playing for Johnstown.
