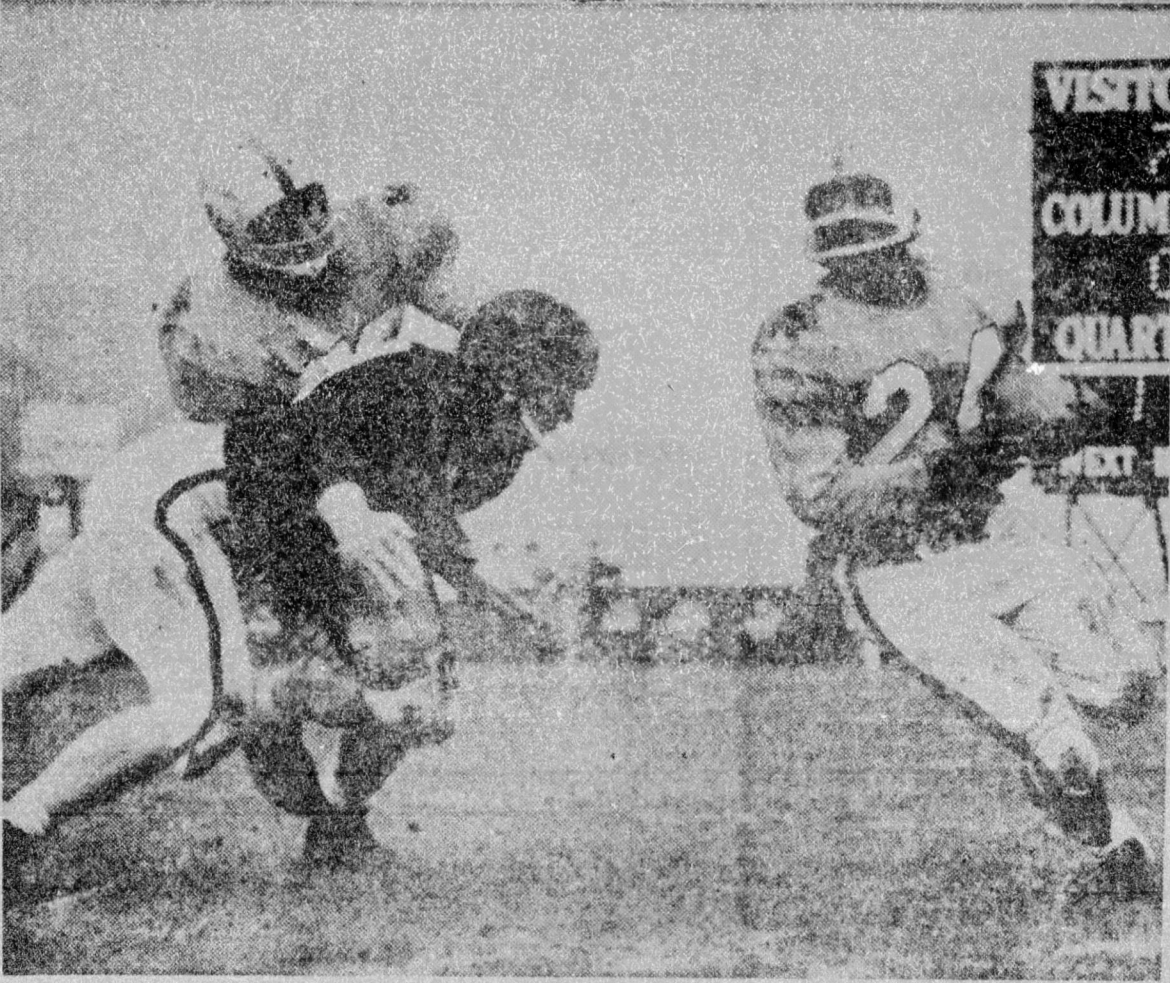


# Football's Last Big Weekend; NCC, A & T In Top Game

NEW YORK (AP)—Has Hurricane Jackson fought his last fight? The New York State Athletic Commission seems to think so. In fact, when the boxer's name is presented again as a contestant, the Commission feels strongly that he will be turned down.

Jackson's manager, Lippy Friedhardt, says he is going to insist that his fighter take a long rest. Jackson's mother, who dominates the scene out of the ring, says all her son needs is to train properly and get his rest, a sort of veiled insinuation that things went amiss in the last two Jackson fights.

In the Patterson fight, Jackson was almost slaughtered and in his

fight with Mather, he suffered a

shorter fate. Is he through? Experts say yes. They even go so far as to say he should never have been permitted to fight the top notch boxers in his division anyhow. Never a stylist with little defense

and no punch, Jackson managed to achieve some degree of fame by his remarkable endurance. This has come by the hands and how. All that remains of the once colorful and emotional "Hurricane" is a small wisp of a gentle breeze.

## Md. Hawks Still Lead CIAA Teams

DURHAM, N. C. — CIAA News Service: The high flying Maryland State Hawks (5-0-1) and a Dickinson of 27-00, apparently invincible, continue leadership of the 18 college CIAA at the end of nine weeks of play.

Last week's biggest upset showed Bluefield trounce North Carolina College 14-0 in a move that this week ties the Big Blues and the Eagles for 4th place in loop play. Each club sports identical win-loss records of 4-2-0, and spot today with 22-91.

Morgan State (4-1-1) 2nd place last week, advanced to runner-up spot today with 22-91.

A and T (3-2-0) and a Dickinson of 22-00, 10th place at the end of the 8th week, today is the 3rd ranking club.

Shaw University (5-2-0 and 20-89), while winner over 15th place Lincoln, a second division club last week, nevertheless dropped from 4th to 6th place.

Previously undefeated Elizabeth City, 5th place last week, dropped a 47-7 win to the Hawks last Saturday and today is the 7th ranking club.

Other teams in the first ten are Virginia Union (4-3-0), 19-28; Winston-Salem (4-2-0), 17-85; and Delaware (3-0-1), 17-00.

ELIZABETH CITY — A spirited Elizabeth City Teachers College took advantage of their scoring opportunities last Saturday afternoon to defeat a Norfolk State eleven, 20-0, and thereby added their sixth victory against one defeat and one tie.

The Teachers started clicking on the first play of the game when Robert Moody caught a 45-yard pass, heaved to him by quarterback Fred Hall, and raced for a touchdown.

Later Elizabeth City recovered a fumble on the five-yard stripe deep in Norfolk State territory. From there George Branch took the ball and plunked over the goal line.

Both teams then settled down to second and third scoreless periods. But in the last quarter Fred Hall, quarterback, sneaked over for a third touchdown.

## NCC Favored To Whip Aggies At Greensboro

King football soon will bow out to basketball as college teams line up for their last big weekend on Thanksgiving Day and Saturday. A number of teams already have completed their season.

A quick lineup of the Huddle's baker's dozen ratings include the following teams:

Lincoln (Mo.), Tennessee State, Florida A and M, Maryland State, Wiley, Prairie View, Texas Southern, Jackson, North Carolina College, Morris Brown, Clark, Southern and Texas College.

Teams with outside changes of making the select list are Greenville, Morehead, Dillard, A and T and South Carolina State.

The above order of teams is about in the right order, depending upon the outcome of the Tennessee State-Lincoln (Mo.) game last Saturday. If Tennessee State won, it should be ranked first.

Big game of the day as far as fan interest and crowd are concerned will pit North Carolina College against A and T in the Carolina Classic. If A and T can win this one, it should move into the final baker's dozen ratings. NCC must win to remain near the top. The Huddle picks NCC.

Another big game will be the inter-city contest between Morris Brown and Clark in Atlanta. As usual, Morris Brown has a strong team. Clark, after a poor start, has become one of the best teams in the nation. It will be a rugged, hard fought contest, but Morris Brown will win.

A second city feud will pit Dillard and Clark in New Orleans. Xavier is having its poorest season in several years. Dillard is having its best. This should be a victory for Dillard in a close one.

Hampton will meet Virginia Union in Richmond in a big one. Virginia Union will defeat a Hampton team that has had its ups and downs. In another CIAA test, Morgan should take an erratic Virginia State team.

Tennessee State should have no trouble with Kentucky State. In other Thanksgiving tilts it will be Savannah State over Paine, South Carolina State over Benedict, Wiley over Texas College, Mississippi Industrial over Rust, and Fort Valley over Albany State.

Three big ones will be played Saturday, Prairie View and Southern, two ambitious squads, will battle it out. Prairie will win.

Texas Southern will face an ambitious Mississippi Vocational squad which is an offensive powerhouse. TSU will edge the boys from Ole Miss Allen, will battle Claflin in a Columbia, S. C. feud with Allen taking it easily.

## Benedict To Have Stronger Quint This Year

COLUMBIA, S. C. — With five promising freshman players and the return of nine lettermen from last year's team, the Benedict College Tigers are expected to better their 10-4 record of a year ago in the SIAC.

Head basketball coach John Brown, who has been leading the squad through workout in the Benedict gym for several weeks, says he expects a stronger, all-around team despite the loss of forward William Thomas and center last June.

The Tigers' are sharpshooter. Earl Keger, is hospitalized and probably will be unable to join the squad until next January.

Decker scored 331 point in regular season play during the 1956-57 year, and is still be counted upon to spearhead the Benedict attack despite a serious injury sustained recently.

Forward Lou Goolsby and his twin brother, Varlee, a guard-natives of Newark, New Jersey, head the corps of veterans on the 1957-58 team.

Lou, a 6'2" 200-pounder scored 204 points last year to rank third behind Keger and guard Eddie Murphy, with 232 points as Benedict high scorers.

Murphy also a native of Newark, stands only 5'10", but is rated one of the best players in the SIAC. He's an expert floorman and talented shooter.

Among the most promising freshmen prospects are Leonard Triplett, 6'5" center of Philadelphia; Walter Simmons, 6'4" forward of New York; Carlos Williams, 6'1" guard of New York.

## Asheville Wins Western AAA Grid Honors

ASHEVILLE — The undefeated Stephens-Lee High School Bears, playing before a large crowd, defeated the Dudley High team of Greensboro 14 to 0 for the Western AAA North Carolina Championship recently.

The first half was all Dudley. The Greensboro lads allowed the Bears only one first down and four times drove deep into Stephens-Lee territory, but Robert Brown personally stopped two of the drives with interceptions. A bit of defensive strategy, mapped out at halftime, and the explosive running of wingback Joe Chandler pulled the Bears from the grip of a scoreless tie.

Midway in the third period the Bears defence perked up and from this point on, Greensboro had trouble moving the ball. Late in the third period the Bears began to roll. Chandler carried on a tricky reverse from Asheville's 47 to the Greensboro's 39.

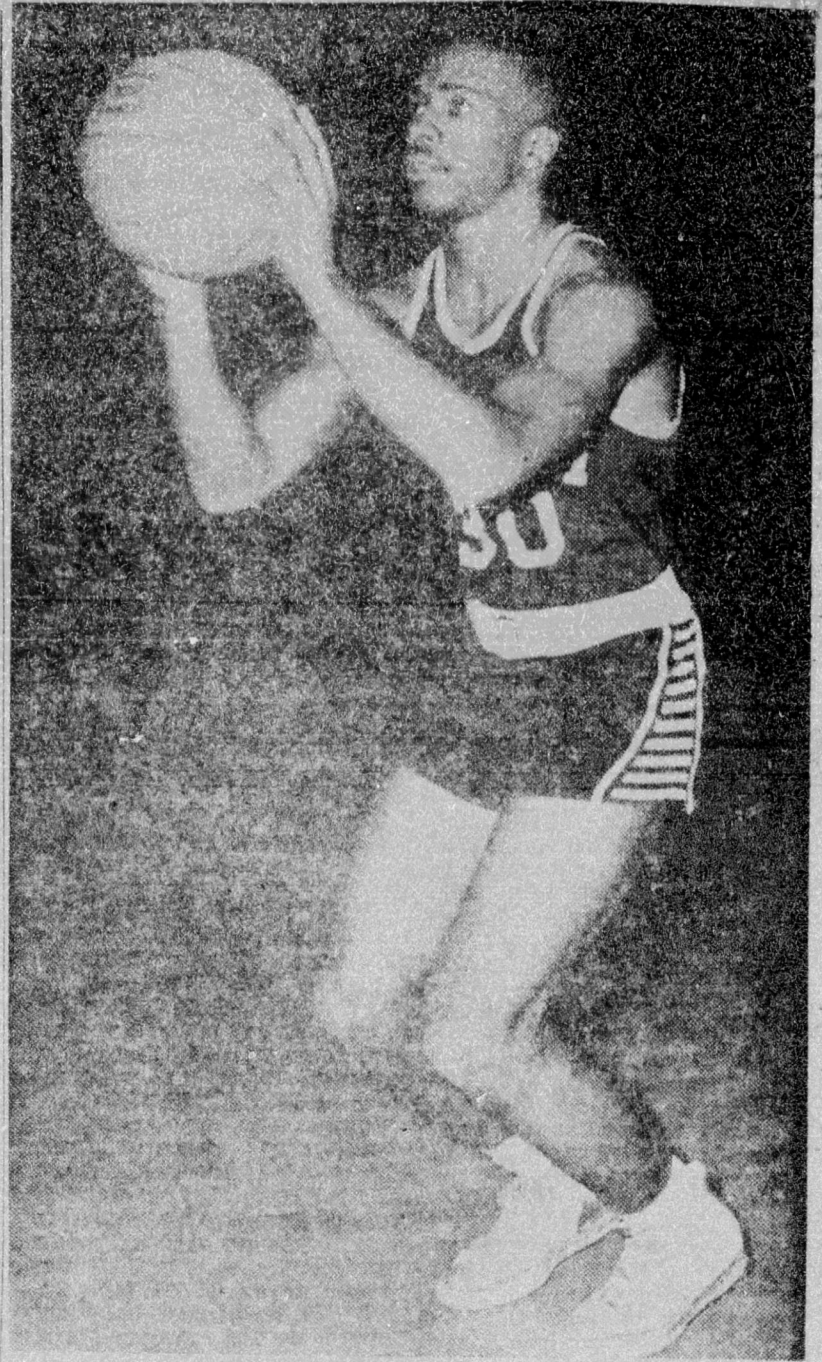
