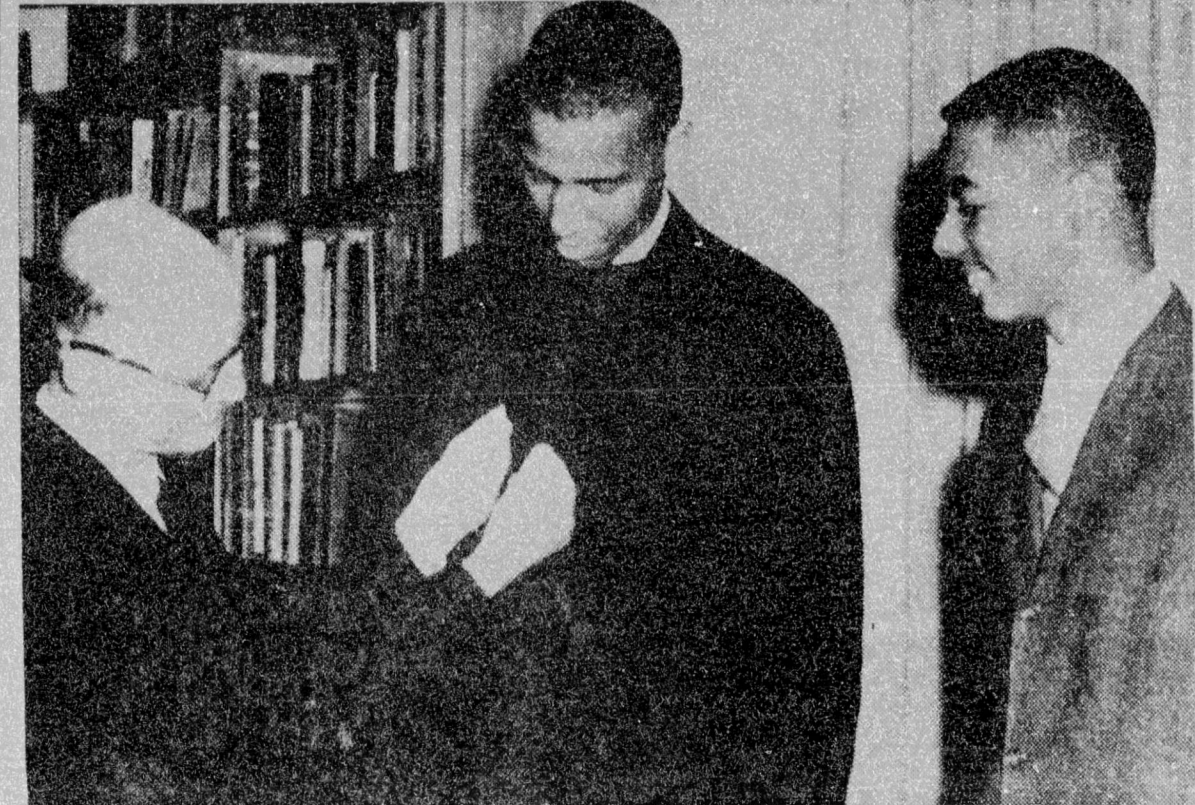
DEB BREAKFAST

A. T. Spaulding National Defense Exec. Reservist

DURHAM — A. T. Spaulding, Vice President, Actuary and Controller of the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company, has been designated by Secretary Dulles a member of the National Defense Executive Reserve for the Department of State "to provide for the continuity of Government in the event of an emergency." Members of the Reserve units would be expected to be available for duty in an executive capacity the moment an emergency develops.

Reservists accept an obligation in event of national emergency, to report immediately to the Department's retention site for whatever tour of duty may be required.

During peacetime, they have an obligation to report to Washington from time to time for orientation sessions in order that they may maintain a general familiarity with the organization and activities of the Department and keep adequately informed on domestic and foreign policy and affairs, including "global briefings" on world conditions and U.S. foreign policy.

The National Defense Executive Reserve was established by Executive Order 10660 of the President under the Defense Production Act Amendments of 1955.

tore the net down, and the Old Raleigh Auditorium went into pandemonium. A thriller had closed the first tournament the home folk had ever seen and the fans showed Armstrong their appreciation by turning out in large numbers.

MR. W. R. COLLINS, Principal at Smithfield and **COACH "HORSE" ANDERSON** of Mary Potter were key men in Army's organization.

The late Dr. C. G. "Cad" O'KELLEY, of North Carolina College at Durham was Dr. James E. Shepard's right arm back in the struggling days of the National Training School ... and later, Durham State Normal—and not too recent—North Carolina College for Negroes ... Dr. O'Kelley was Dr. Shepard's "Man Friday" and acted in his capacity on many occasions. He led the college with students, ... kept the athletic teams (especially baseball, and later basketball) well supplied with top-flight athletes. ... He seldom missed a big college, high school or fourth of July "country" baseball game in town, city or state. ... And if any player showed "outstanding promise" of becoming a college sensation, the "Cad" would always supply the necessary encouragement to continue his performances in Durham at North Carolina College.

He brought such outstanding personalities to Durham as Louis Austin, the present publisher of the Carolina Times, from Enfield, who was a crack baseball pitcher in his day. ... "Doll" Hayward, Raleigh Undertaker, also a master moundman and a keen competitor. ... The great "Cheese" Vinson of Selma, now principal of Riley Hill High School in suburban Raleigh, who was one of the greatest pitchers of all time, barring none. ... Theodore "Ted" Stroud, of Chapel Hill, first baseman and pitcher of excellence and now bookkeeper at the Durham Mechanics and Farmers Bank. ... Old and "Ted" was an "iron man" full-back on the football team. ... Ike Sparrow from New Bern, a tough infielder and a terrific batter, who now runs a clothing store in Boston, Mass. ... William Nutall, the sensational fire-baller of Mary Potter, before "Cad" moved him to Durham and "Lefty" Cooke of Bish Point, the greatest first baseman ever seen in the Carolinas before or since. ... Cooke died shortly after his playing days. ... And many more that space will not permit us to mention. ... But now you seldom hear his name mentioned around the campus—although the athletic field is open in the fall and boys before the school took on the name "North Carolina" in 1907. It is a good bet that some of the present players around the country that came to North Carolina through the influence of Dr. C. G. "Cad" O'Kelley never heard of the present "profs". ... Is another good bet.
