

# Veep Nixon Wins Award For Aiding Race Amity

NEW YORK CITY (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon will receive on December 15th the second annual Irving M. Ives Award of "Task Force 57," a unit of the New York State Republican Committee which works with minority groups.

According to the announcement, Mr. Nixon will receive the award for his "continuing efforts - in words and deeds - to make the world a better place for men of all races and creeds and color to live together in peace and harmony."

The announcement was released by Walter E. Bligh, state committee secretary, and Julius J. Adams, a state committeeman and New York City newspaperman.

In 1956 the award was given to Dr. Robert H. Johnson, Grand Excited Ruler of the Improved Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

Messrs. Bligh and Adams pointed out the Vice-President had been especially saluted for "his work in successful efforts to secure passage by the United States Senate of the first piece of civil rights legislation to be passed by Congress."

## Dillard Prof Given \$22,000 Cancer Grant

DILLARD PROF. Awarded \$22,000 NEW ORLEANS—Dr. Edward E. Riley Jr., associate professor of biology and chairman of the division of the natural sciences at Dillard University, has been awarded a three-year grant of \$22,000 by the National Cancer Institute of the U. S. Public Health Service to continue his research in the biological phenomena of cancer, it was revealed by Dr. Albert W. Dent, president of the university.

Dr. Riley's studies, which are concerned primarily with catalase enzyme activity in the liver tissue of cancerous organisms, are part of a world-wide search for basic scientific data about cancer. He began his studies five years ago.

## Enrollment Of 468 Announced By Livingstone

SALISBURY—Final enrollment figures for the 1957-58 school year, as released by the office of the registrar, show a total of 468 students at Livingstone College. This number is about the same as last year's enrollment, which was the largest opening registration on record. Of these 412 are in the college of liberal arts and 56 are in the Hood Theological Seminary. Of the total 275 are women, while 193 are men.

A breakdown by classes show a total of 74 seniors, 85 juniors, 103 sophomores, 144 freshmen, the second largest in the history of the institution; 22 are unclassified, two are special students and 12 are in the evening school.

According to the geographical distribution, 19 states, the District of Columbia, and three foreign countries are represented. North Carolina leads the list with 243, followed by South Carolina with 41.

Other listings include New York, 18; Pennsylvania, eight; Florida and Alabama 6 each; Tennessee, five; Connecticut, Kentucky, and Indiana 4 each; Georgia, New Jersey, District of Columbia, and Ghana (West Africa) three each; Massachusetts and South America, 3 each; Arkansas, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, Mississippi, Virginia, and Liberia (West Africa) one each.

Although Livingstone College is under the auspices of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, the institution is non-sectarian from the standpoint of its student body and faculty.

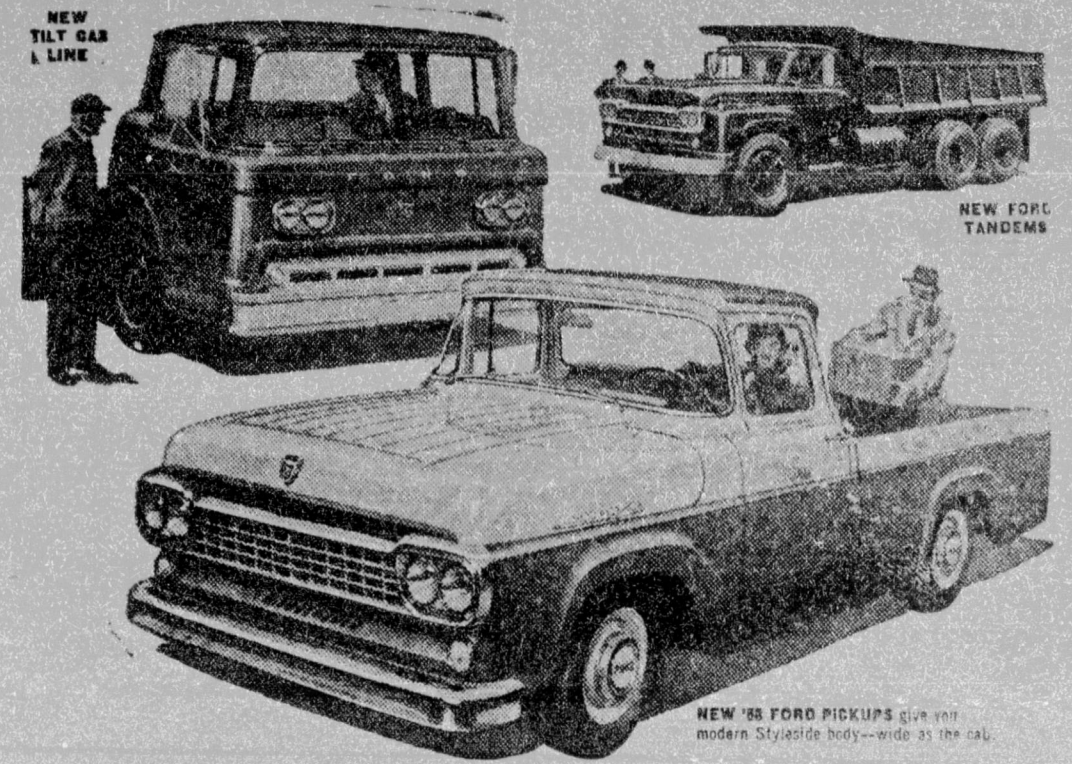
