Enrollment Of 468 Announced By Livingstone

SALISBURY-Final enrollment figures for the 1957-58 school year, as released by the office of the registrar, show a total of 468 students at Livingstone Colege. This number is about the same as last year's enrollment, which was the largest opening registration on record. Of these 412 are in the college of liberal arts and 26 are in the Hood Theological Seminary. Of the total 275 are women, while 193 are men.

A breakdown by classes show a total of 74 seniors, 85 juniors 103 sophomores, 144 freshmen, the second largest in the history of the institution; 22 are unclassified, two are special students and 12 are in the evening school.

According to the geographical distribution, 19 states, the District of Columbia, and three foreign countries are represented. North Carolina leads the list with 243, folowed by South Carolina with

Other listings include New York, 18, Pennsylvania, eight, Florida and Alabama 6 each Tennessee, five, Connecticut, Kentucky, and Indiana 4 each, Georgia, New Jersey, District of Columbia, and Ghana (West Africa) three each; Massachu-seits and South America 3 each; Arkansas, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, Mississipul, Virginia and Liberia (West Afica) one each.
