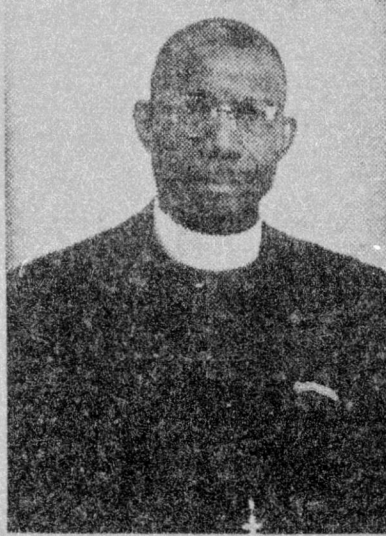

## Rev. A. B. Moseley Rounding Out 40 Years As Zion Cleric

KINSTON — When the Rev. A. B. Moseley received his appointment at the close of the Cape Fear Conference, AMEZ Church, which convened in Southport, he

was rounding out 40 years of service in the ministry.

He was born in Craven County and after attending the public schools of his native county, went to Eastern Carolina Industrial Academy, New Bern. He later entered Livingstone College, where he received his A.B. degree and his B.D. from Hood Theological Seminary. He was licensed to preach in 1917 and joined the North Carolina Conference.

While a student at Livingstone he pastored at Piney Grove and Cleveland. He has served many of the leading churches in North Carolina, of his denomination. He is now the presiding elder of the Wilson District and has served as the presiding elder of the Washington District.

The story of his service to the ministry was best told at a testimonial tendered him at St. John AME Zion Church by the pastor, the Rev. U. S. Johnson, officers, members and friends from throughout eastern North Carolina.

Many said that he was following in the footsteps of his father, the late Dr. J. H. Moseley, who also served the Wilson District for 22 years.

## Union Chiefs Blast Bigotry

DETROIT (AP) — "Race-hatred is the new union-busting weapon of management and the year 1957 possibly may go down as the year of infamy," James B. Carey, president, International Union of Electrical Workers AFL-CIO, on Friday advised the 250 delegates attending the IUE National Civil Rights Conference in Detroit.

Without mincing words, both Carey and Al Harbnett, IUE secretary-treasurer and chairman of the IUE Civil Rights conference noted that profit-obsessed big business was attempting to pit race in its fight to destroy unions.

Carey accused Southern employers and the multi-million dollar Northern industrial giants of unleashing "a new and uncivilized kind of warfare" against organized labor by "employing this latest unscrupulous technique against labor."
