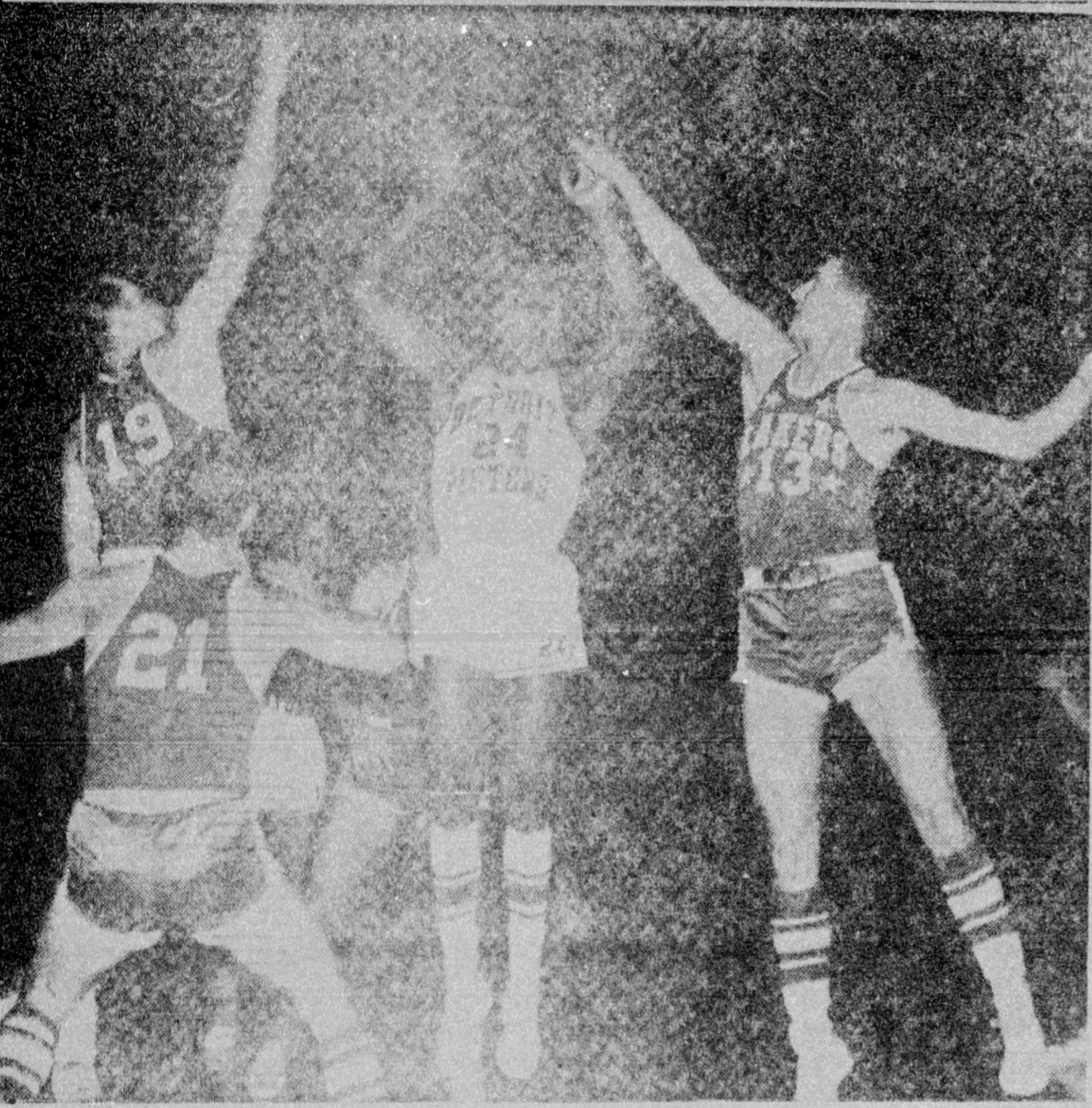

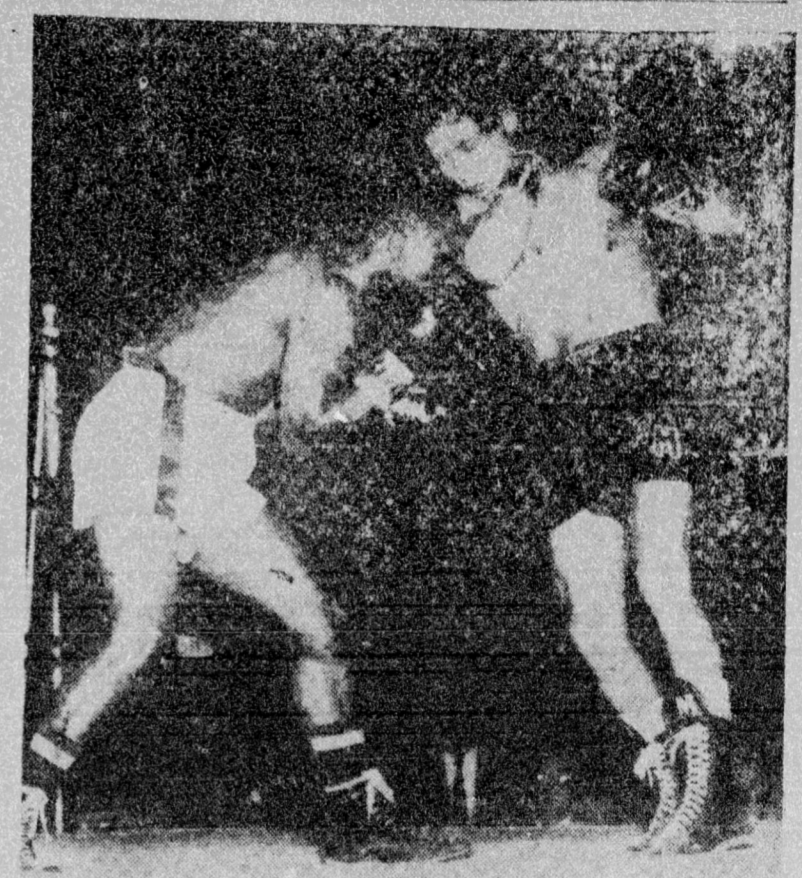

Hampton To Open Cage Season Sat.

HAMPTON, Va. — Hampton Institute Fighting Pirates open the 1957-58 basketball season Saturday, December 6, against St. Paul Polytechnic Institute in Lawrenceville, Va., with a new coach at the helm.

Frank E. Enty, 36, replaces Ben Whitley, now head football coach for the Pirates, in the head hardwood position. Enty came to Hampton in 1955 as director of inter-mural activities.

As a member of the West Virginia State Coliseum class of '50, Enty played on three CIAA championship basketball teams. After graduation he worked in Pittsburgh, then in 1954 enrolled at North Carolina College in Durham, receiving his M.A. Degree in Physical Education in the following year.

When asked about the sound this season Enty declared, "We have only one senior letterman, Capt. Bland T. Brokenborough of Washington, D. C. I've been pleased, though, with the caliber of players that tried out and made the squad. There are several promising sophomores and stand-out rookies that should add up to a hustling team. We hope to make up with defense tactics what we lack in height and experience."

Marion Anderson Sings To 10,000 At Ghandi Mem.

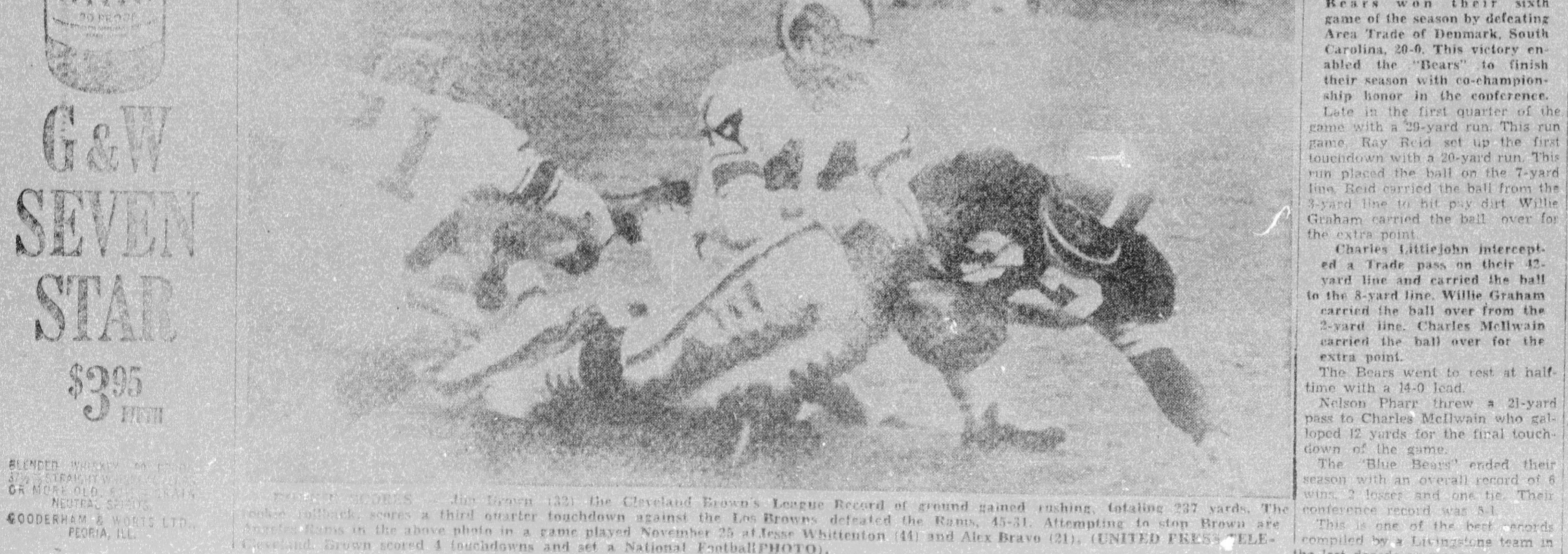
NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Congress singer Marion Anderson sang to a group of 10,000 people at a Ghandi memorial here today.
