

### 2 Spanked On Wrists For Parts In Little Rock Riots

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — The Municipal Court of Little Rock last week issued a mild rebuke to two persons accused of disorderly conduct during demonstrations against the admission of nine Negro students at embattled Central High School last Sept. 23.

Charles Partlow of Little Rock and H. V. Turner of North Little Rock were fined \$25.00 each by Judge Harry C. Robinson, who also suspended the fines.

Charges of disturbing the peace were dismissed also in the cases of H. D. Brown of Pine Bluff, Ark., Aubrey Plummer of Little Rock and Tommy Phillips of North Little Rock, when Acting Police Chief Gen. Smith said he could not recall what part the three allegedly took in the mob action.

In testimony during the trial Partlow said the crowd pushed him through police lines and he found himself in custody.

Turner, accused of hitting Frances Miller, a Life magazine photographer, admitted the assault but said that Miller had shoved him twice and had been abusive.

At this stage of the trial Judge Robinson announced that a disturbance charge against Miller would not be prosecuted. Noting that the photograph is now in California, the jurist took a dig at him, saying: "For my part, he can stay there."

### Dr. Strassner, Liberian Student At Rocky Mt.; Cet \$562 For Shaw

**ROCKY MOUNT** — Guest minister at the St. James Baptist Church here Sunday was Dr. William Russell Strassner, president of Shaw University, Raleigh, who spoke on "About My Father's Business" at the church observed its annual "Shaw Day" services under the direction of its pastor, the Rev. William Lockett Mason, who, incidentally, announced that this season marked his twentieth anniversary as pastor of the local church.

Dr. Strassner made it plain that nearly 300,000 Baptists in Tarheelia must more and more come to the aid of religious education if Shaw University — the denominations' only college — is to take its rightful role in developing Christian leaders.

At the morning services Pastors Mason told Rev. Strassner that due to the sharp increase in unemployment among colored citizens locally (the reported 3000 out of work during September) the church and its auxiliaries were only able to present \$562.75 to Shaw at this time. Mason assured the college head that there would be more given before the March deadline when the college, its alumni and friends are challenged to raise at least \$1,000 over and above its regular budget in order to receive a special grant of \$10,000 from a friendly source. Donations may be sent direct to Shaw University, Raleigh, N. C. The local Shaw Alumni Club is aiding in this project guided by J. W. Wiley.

Accompanying Dr. and Mrs. Strassner here was Amos J. Smith, a native Liberian student, studying at Shaw University under a special scholarship from the Government of Liberia and Shaw jointly.

Mr. Smith talked to the Susan Sanders Missionary Circle Sunday afternoon on a program directed by Mrs. Mamie Ryals, several youths who attended the Lott Carey Missionary Convention in Orange, N. J., last summer also reported.

Smith said he was from the territory Marshall, appropriately named after General George C. Marshall, father of the Marshall Plan of aid to needy nations. His home is about 50 miles from the capital city—Monrovia, Liberia and he has been in America only three months, but has been quite observant of American customs.

Some of these are that American women do not appreciate their hair as do the women of his country. Smith finds the American female cuts her hair whereas, only those Liberian women who have come to America go home and cut their hair, and then they are the object of scorn.

During a question and answer period it was revealed that, although Liberia has a minister of war in its cabinet (which is on the American plan) there is no sizeable military establishment in the 110-year-old Negro republic whose founders were emigrants and descendants from former slaves from America.

Smith explained that due to the deep religious convictions of the Liberians, the nation has not armed itself in a formidable manner and they have not been faced with any great military threat during its 110 years of existence. They have an abiding faith in God and mankind.

Smith told the high school students they would have to study algebra, chemistry, physics and biology until they reached the junior year in college when they could begin specializing.

Smith warned all organizations (particularly females) being sent to Africa as missionaries because, he said, if they are too young they will be overcome with the prosperity of Liberia and forsake their Missionary work and become, as he put it, "money-aries." He cited examples of such.

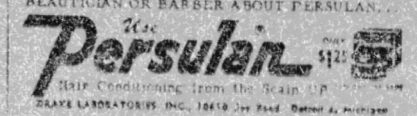

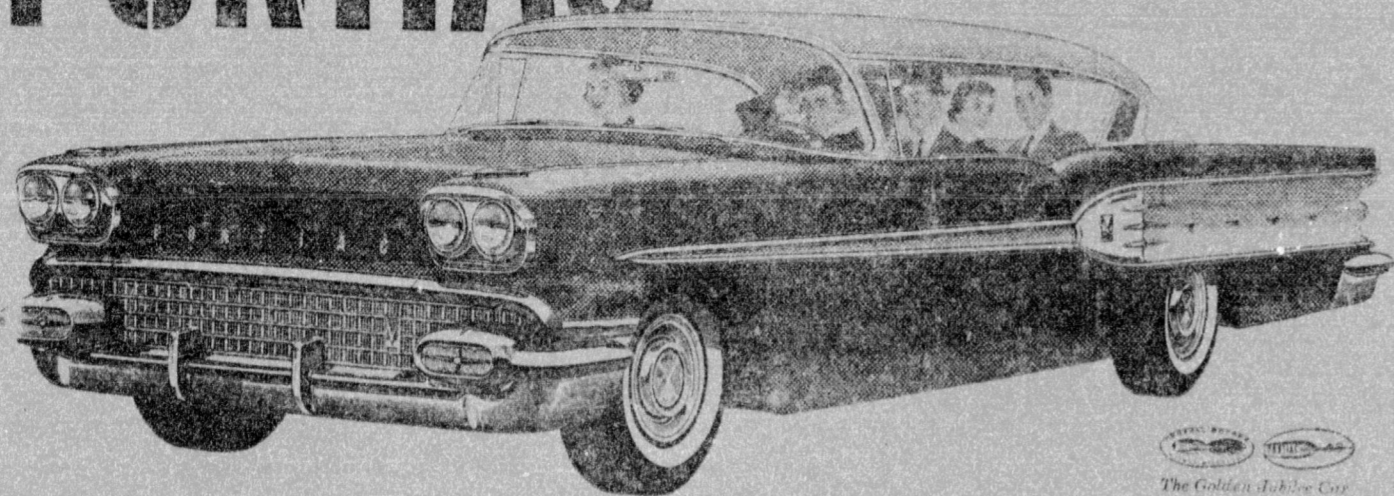

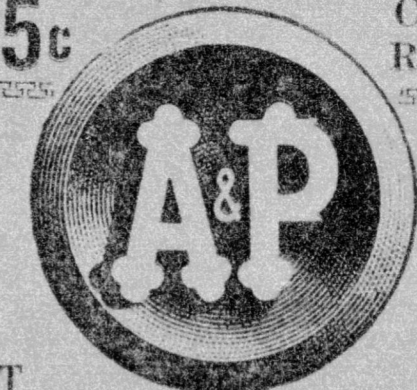
