Post Office Department Investigates New Stamp

WASHINGTON—Post office department officials said they would look into a segregationist stamp depicting soldiers with bayonets pointed at teenagers' backs which might be illegal.

The stamp bearing the legend "Remember Little Rock," are being distributed throughout the South by the White Citizens Council.

Attorney General Eugene Cook of Georgia, a segregationist leader, announced that all his official mail was carrying the stamps.

General Counsel Abe Goff

said he could not comment on the legality of the stamps until he had studied them.

However, he said federal law forbids putting anything on the outside of stamps bearing "intended to reflect injuriously the character or reputation of anyone."

Robert Patterson, White Council executive secretary, said the Council was distributing the stamps "because we don't want people to forget about the use of troops in Arkansas."

\$90,000,000 Plans Set By Industries In CP & L Territory

Industries announced plans in 1957 to spend \$90,236,000 for new and expanded plants in Carolina Power & Light Company's service area. This is the greatest industrial advance in recent years and tops the 1956 figure of \$61,929,500.

These industrial plans will create 6,830 new jobs and brings \$19,362,500 in additional payrolls to Carolinians.

Sixty-six of the plants are new, and many will manufacture products entirely new to the Carolinians. Expansions are set for 67 existing plants.

Dan E. Stewart, manager of CP&L's area development department, credits the record-breaking growth to the area's industrial climate, cooperative efforts of other development agencies, natural resources, available electric power, trainable labor, and especially to the untiring efforts among CP&L communities to attract industries.

During the year CP&L's development department worked hard in glove with local groups, other utilities and state development agencies to bring industry to the north central South Carolina, and CP&L service area, which covers coastal, central and western North Carolina.

Stewart was appreciative of their assistance. "Without the concerted efforts of all," he said, "such a record could not have been made. We are especially gratified to see new plants and expansions in areas considered primarily agricultural. Such a trend means new diversification and a higher standard of living in these areas."

The \$40 million Allied-Kennecott Titanium plant at Wilmington led the 1957 industrial parade in the CP&L area, and for that matter in the entire two-state area.

Women Taking Advantage Of Retirement Age

"Many women in this area are taking advantage of the new retirement age for women," declares John Ingle, manager of the Raleigh office of the Social Security Administration.

The woman worker or the wife of a retired insured worker who chooses to receive benefits between the age of 62 and 65 will receive a reduced benefit and will continue to receive the reduced rate after reaching age 65. Widows of benefits, however, are now payable at age 52 without a reduction in the amount of benefit, even though a reduced wife's benefit was received prior to the death of the husband.

Also, when a widow files for payment on her deceased husband's account, her marriage certificate will be needed. A birth certificate established at time of birth or a baptismal certificate will usually serve as proof of age, or if one of these documents is not available old records such as insurance pol-
