Javits Points To Little Rock Debacle; Plans To Restore Teeth To Rights Bill

WASHINGTON (ANP)—Senator Jacob K. Javits, New York Republican, announced last week that he plans to introduce in the coming session of Congress legislation aimed at restoring provisions knocked out of the watered-down civil rights bill passed during the last session.

Pointing to last year's "Little Rock crisis as a case in point, Javits said it "highlighted the importance" of Congress restoring Part III of the rights bill authorizing the Attorney General to begin civil injunctive proceedings against local officials or those "conspiring" to deprive a citizen of his constitutional rights.

His plans are directly opposite of the administration's announced intention to play a waiting game and let the integration situation simmer down.

He also took issue with Atty. Gen. William Rogers, saying he "should not be compelled to rely upon the happenstance that a decree to enforce civil rights has already been entered upon the part of some individuals affected or some public body." He referred to the Little Rock Board of Education injunction in the Central High School controversy. He said such injunctions "will occur all too rarely."

Rogers had said also that the Eisenhower administration plans no new civil rights legislation, adding that the law already passed should be given a chance to be tested.

Javits is not the only legislator seeking to strengthen the civil rights law to curb local officials opposed to integration. Recently Congressman Adam Clayton Powell of New York announced that he also plans to introduce legislation to keep a governor from using National Guard troops to block integration.

2 Men Rob Construction Firm's Cashier Of \$150

WASHINGTON (ANP)—Two men, described as Negroes, held up a white construction firm payroll clerk in her home and robbed her of \$150 here last week.

Victims of the robbery were Mrs. Fay Penn, 40, who with her maid, Miss Gertrude Jones, 36, Negro, were bound and gagged by the gunmen. Mrs. Penn, secretary-cashier of the Mink-off Company, Inc. had gone to her home during the lunch hour after a trip to the bank in the morning. Police say the robbers evidently thought she had picked up the weekly payroll for the firm and took it

home with her. Hearing a knock at the door, she opened it, and said a young man told her he had a package for "Gertrude." Mrs. Penn called the maid, and when she came into the room, the man took out a pistol and ordered both women back into the kitchen.

At this point, a second man entered, and bound the two women up. The took Mrs. Penn's purse, containing \$150 and fled.

Mrs. Penn said she had been picking up the payroll on Fridays, but began changing her routine because of being followed about a month ago.

White Woman Claims Sepian Beat Her Up

CHARLESTON, S. C. (ANP)—A 28-year-old white woman of the Windsor Drive-in on State highway 325 north of the city, told police here last week that an early morning Negro prowler who knocked at her door, beat her up when she answered his knock.

She was taken to Roper Hospital for treatment of bruises. The incident occurred about 2:45 a.m. she said.
