## Ultra-Spoiled Wives Treat Husbands As Second-Rate Citizens, Declares Author Of "Woman: The Dominant Sex"

NEW YORK CITY — Compared with today's women, modern American men are physical weaklings. The result is that we have a veritable army of henpecked husbands who not only are treated as second-rate citizens, but are kicked around by ultra-spoiled wives. So writes Henrik De Loeuw in "Woman: The Dominant Sex," one of the year's most disturbing and controversial books. It is published by

Thomas Yoseloff Inc., New York (Dec. 5, \$3.95).

It is woman who rules the family, home, and children and governs the nation's taste, morals, and culture so that our attitude toward love has been neurotically debased, writes family man de Loeuw who, incidentally, has been happily married for 27 years. The new book is also attracting wide attention abroad.

The "self-sufficient, overbearing, and often masculinized women" have not only turned the United States into a matriarchy that has uprooted the normal patterns of family living, but have also acquired a firm hold on our economy, making it increasingly difficult for

men to retain their individuality and traditional sexual status.

Many of today's major concerns may, the author charges, be traced to this woman-dominated culture. "Owing to bad upbringing, discipline and respect for elders have become forgotten words in our vocabulary... the whirlwind of crime we are reaping now may also be partly due to an almost complete lack of orderly conduct in home and school."

The husband, "demanding less, and giving women more in a material sense than do husbands in other lands has been turned into something characterized often as a 'Jiggs,' a 'Walter Mitty,' a 'Caspar Milquostast'."

## 'The Crowning Experience' Highlights MRA Assembly

MACKINAC ISLAND, Mich.—"The Crowning Experience," a new musical play, was the highlight of the Moral Re-Armament Assembly which brought to Mackinac Island, Michigan, 800 people from all parts of America and Canada during the past Yuletide season.

This play was inspired by the life of the great educator, Mrs. Mary McLeod Bethune, the daughter of slave parents, who rose to be advisor to presidents and one of the most honored of her race.

When Mrs. Bethune was 80 years old, she came to a Moral Re-Armament Assembly. There she opened her heart to a new commitment, saying, "To be a part of this great uniting force of our age is

the crowning of my life." Delegates and visitors were called by Dr. Frank Butcher's National Call to America in which he said, "America's truest export is not just a bigger better materialism, but the crowning experience of the rebirth of our faith in the hearts of the people."

On January 4 the new musical opened in Detroit at the Henry and Edsel Ford Auditorium for four special performances, prior to beginning its world premiere on January 11 in Atlanta, Georgia.

Cast members in the musical play include: Muriel Smith, Ann Buckles, Susie Cabanero of the Philippines and Louis Byles of Jamaica.

## 2 Vo-Ag Officials Promoted

GREENSBORO—Two officials of the North Carolina Vocational Agriculture program in Negro schools were recently elevated to the new posts of district supervisors.

Those promoted included W. T. Johnson, and James W. Warren, Jr., both former assistant supervisors of Vocational Agricultural Education with headquarters here at A. and T. College.

The promotions announced by A. G. Bullard, Raleigh, State supervisor of Vocational Agriculture, were made to fill the vacancy left by S. B. Simmons, assistant supervisor of Vo-Ag who died last July.

Johnson will continue as director of North Carolina Negro Farmers of America and will work in the coordination of the total State program in Negro schools.

A native of Rock Point in Pender County, Johnson holds, both, the

B.S. and M.S. degrees from A. and T. College and has done further study at Purdue University. His work experience includes: Vo-Ag teaching, Spring Hope, 1932-37; farm shop teacher trainer at A. and T., 1938-41; assistant supervisor of Vo-Ag in charge of Defense and Rural War Production Program, 1941-45 and itinerant teacher trainer in West Virginia, 1948-52, where he organized the Vo-Ag program, all before he took his former assignment here in Greensboro in 1952.
