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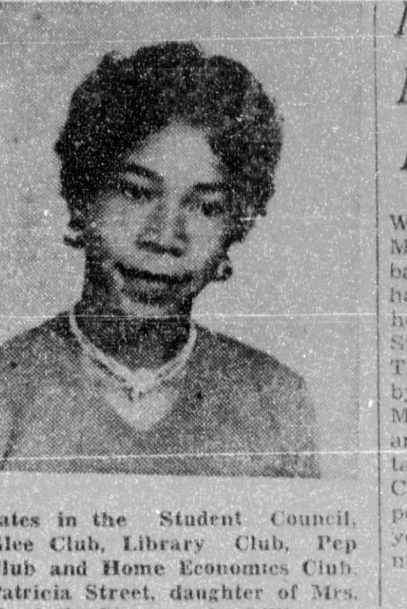
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## Meharry Student Nurse Is Taking Part In Contest

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—Miss Doris Williams, a senior in the Meharry Medical College, George W. Hubbard Hospital School of Nursing, has been selected to represent the hospital in the "Miss Methodist Student Nurse" contest for 1958. This contest is sponsored annually by the National Association of Methodist Hospitals and Homes and the general Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Methodist Church, Chicago, Illinois. The purpose is to select a representative young lady who is symbolic of the nursing profession.

Miss Williams will compete with candidates from the 58 Methodist hospital schools of nursing throughout the United States. Each school selects its candidates by committee vote from the administrative and nursing staffs. The winner will be awarded a trip to the Annual Convention of the National Association of Methodist Hospitals and Homes, meeting in Chicago, Ill., February 11-13, 1958.

Miss Williams was born and raised in Tampa, Florida. After completion of high school, she attended Clark College in Atlanta, Georgia. Upon completing a two-year liberal arts course, she entered Meharry Medical College School of Nursing.

Miss Williams is President of the Senior Nursing Class and a member of the Meharry Students. She is very active in student nursing organizations on the local, state, and national level and represented Meharry at the National Association of Student Nurses in 1955.

In accordance with the rules of the contest, all candidates for the title must be attractive, have a pleasing personality, be a senior in the upper third of her class scholastically, and must display a sincere professional interest in nursing.

**APEX**—On Monday evening, January 20, the Adult Education Program was held at the Apex Library. Mrs. Irene T. Stewart is librarian.

Attorney George R. Greene of Raleigh was the guest speaker. He was introduced and presented by Mrs. Annie Robinson of the Richard B. Harrison Library of Raleigh.

Lawyer Greene used as a subject, "Some Legal Obligations Often Neglected for Wholesome Family Life—The making of a Will."

The speaker related that a will is one of the finest legal documents that one can have, for often lawsuits are made when one last made for most poor individuals feel that anything that comes for nothing, is worth fighting for.

The young lawyer stated that often farmers are moved from arms unfairly, because they don't know their legal rights.

A very valuable piece of information that he gave the group was that farmers should learn to keep accurate records in detail of money and merchandise bought and money borrowed and terms set.

Lawyer Greene gave the difference between life insurance and fire insurance as to validity. He stated that life insurance is not valid until the company puts its OK on the policy, but that fire insurance is valid as of the time written.

The speaker further pointed out that in the signing of a contract, he said that each person gives up something of value in order to have an enforceable contract.

Following the lawyer's discourse, the people present asked his various questions in which they were interested.

At the close of the discussion, Mr. W. N. Beasley and Mrs. Annie Robinson gave words of appreciation to Lawyer Greene.

On Tuesday night, February 18, the library will open its doors to another speaker, Mr. Charles Robeson of Shaw University. The time of the meeting is 7:45.

On Sunday, January 26, 1958, Dr. G. S. Cant, presiding elder of the Raleigh District, preached at the St. Mary's AME Church of Apex. 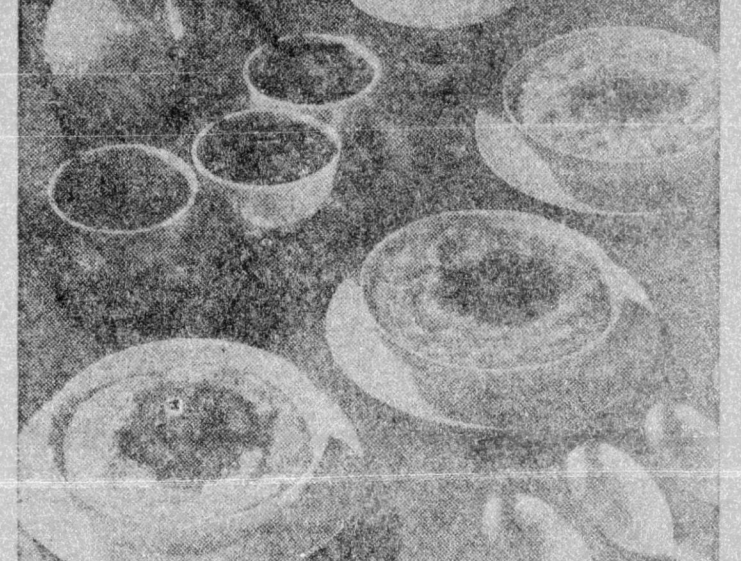
Jervay was discovered by two members of the Goldsboro Rescue Squad landing from a broken tree. The two men said he told them that he had been hanging in that position since Wednesday of last week. The publisher could talk according to the men, and knew what day it was. They were reportedly taking a quick look along the bank for Jervay when they heard his cries.

Missing from his Wilmington home since Tuesday, Jervay told the rescuers that he had fallen into the river and couldn't swim. The current carried him downstream, he related, and to the tree branch.

His discovery, ended a search in the area of the State Hospital, on the outskirts of Goldsboro, which had begun Thursday night.

It was believed that Jervay was missing after his station wagon was found parked near the hospital, where it remained for a couple of days.

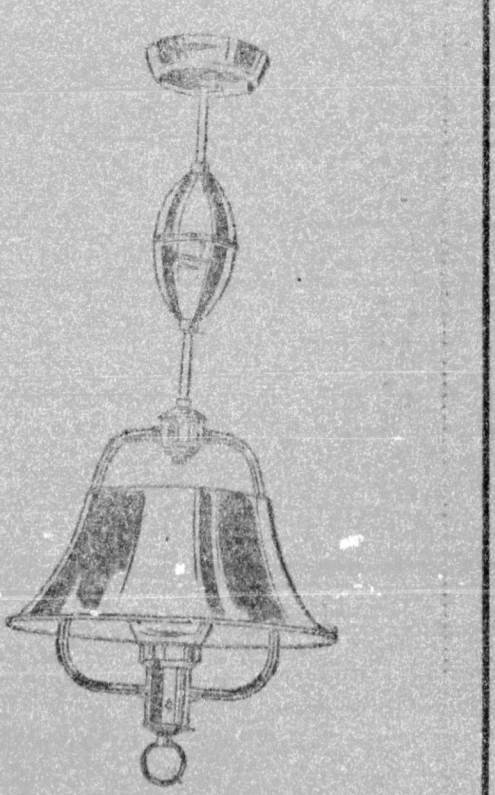
