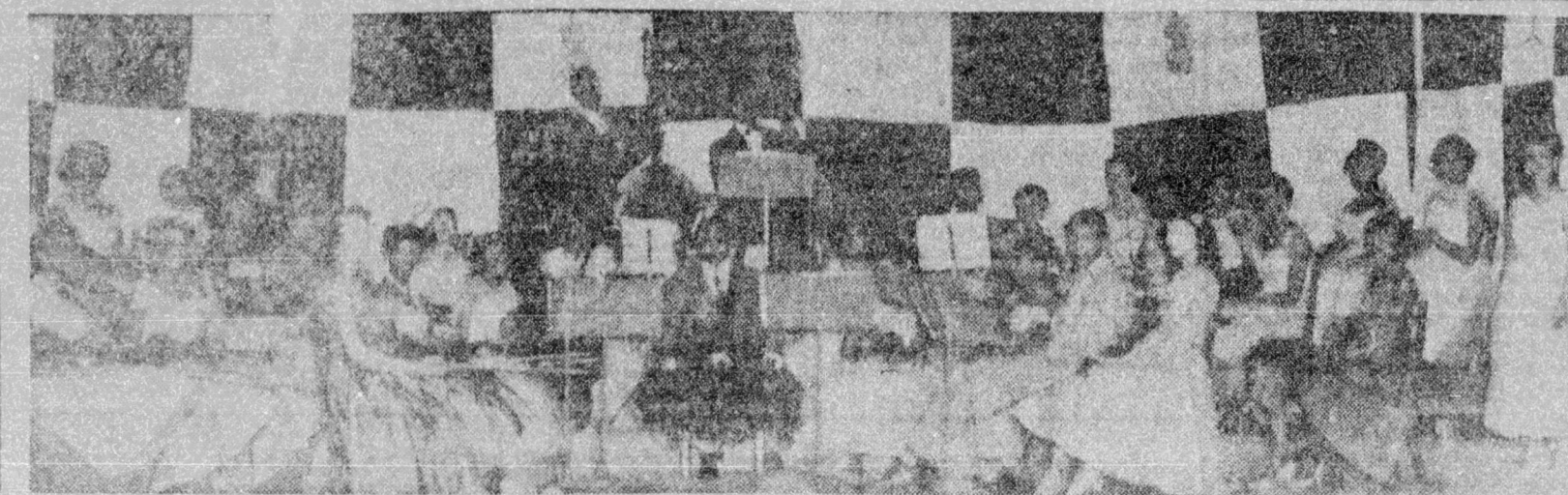

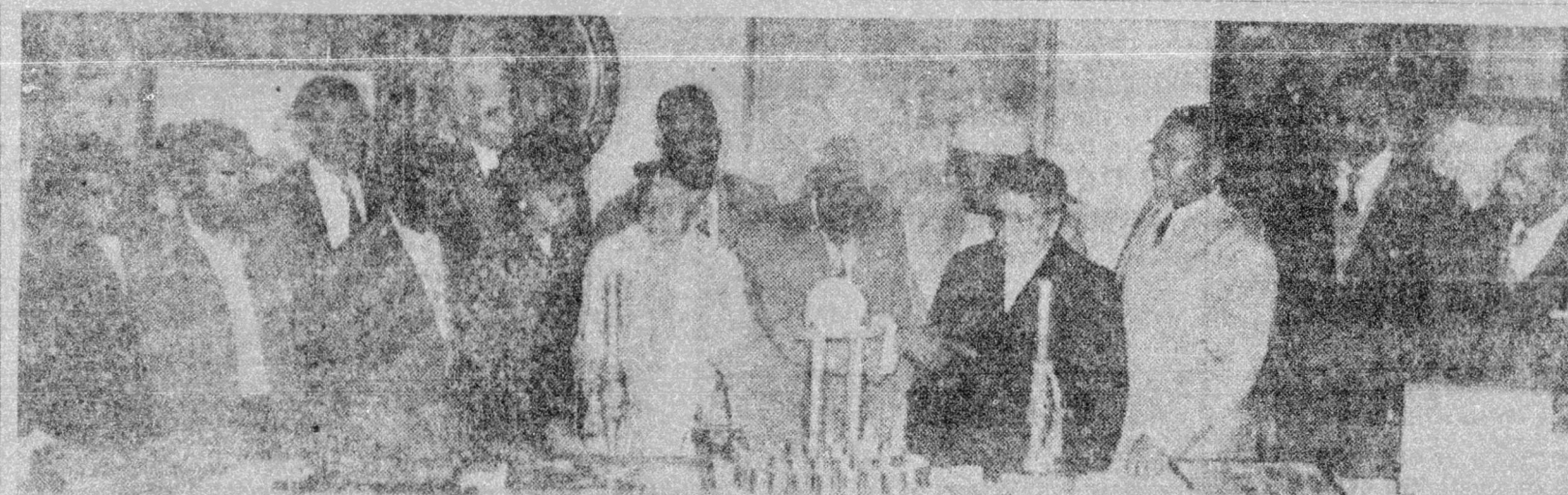


THE LITTLE STRING ORCHESTRA of the Raleigh Public Schools presented a concert

## 16 Grand Allocation Received By Smith U.

CHARLOTTE — An allocation of \$16,891.21 has been received by Johnson C. Smith University from the United Negro College Fund, President Rufus P. Perry announced. This amount brings the total received by Johnson C. Smith University from the national appeal to \$124,237.76.

During the current year, UNCF allocations have been used principally to provide scholarship and work aid for exceptional students who otherwise would not be able to continue their education; to purchase books and laboratory and classroom equipment; and to enlarge the reading room of the library and supplement teachers' salaries.

## Bennett College Faculty Group Takes Part In Campus Workshop

GREENSBORO — Four members of the Bennett College faculty have been selected to participate in the second Campus Community Workshop sponsored by the Danforth Foundation at Colorado College, Colorado Springs, this summer.

Some 30 church-related liberals arts colleges are sending teams to the workshop which will be directed by Dr. Kenneth I. Brown. Representing Bennett will be Dr. Chauncey G. Winston, chairman of the division of social sciences; Miss Louise G. Street, instructor in clothing and family life; Van S. Allen, instructor in biology and health education; and Francis Grandison, instructor in psychology and director of psychological services.

Their project will be "Greater Synthesis in Our Program of General Education, with reference to Subject Matter, Guidance Service and Application Beyond the Classroom." The workshop will extend from June 23 to July 12.

Registration for evening courses at St. Augustine's College will continue through February 12 during the hours that classes meet. Thursday at 6:30 p. m. "Parliamentary Law" meets Thursday at 6:30 p. m. while "Methods of Speech Correction and Therapy" meets Wednesday at 6:30 p. m. Both classes are meeting in room 202, Hunter Building. The instructor is Dr. Marcus C. Boulware.

Typing for "Beginners" meets Tuesday at 6:30 p. m. while "Refresher Short-hand" meets at 6:30 p. m. on Thursdays. Both classes meet in room 302, Hunter Building. Mrs. M. B. Wright is the instructor.
