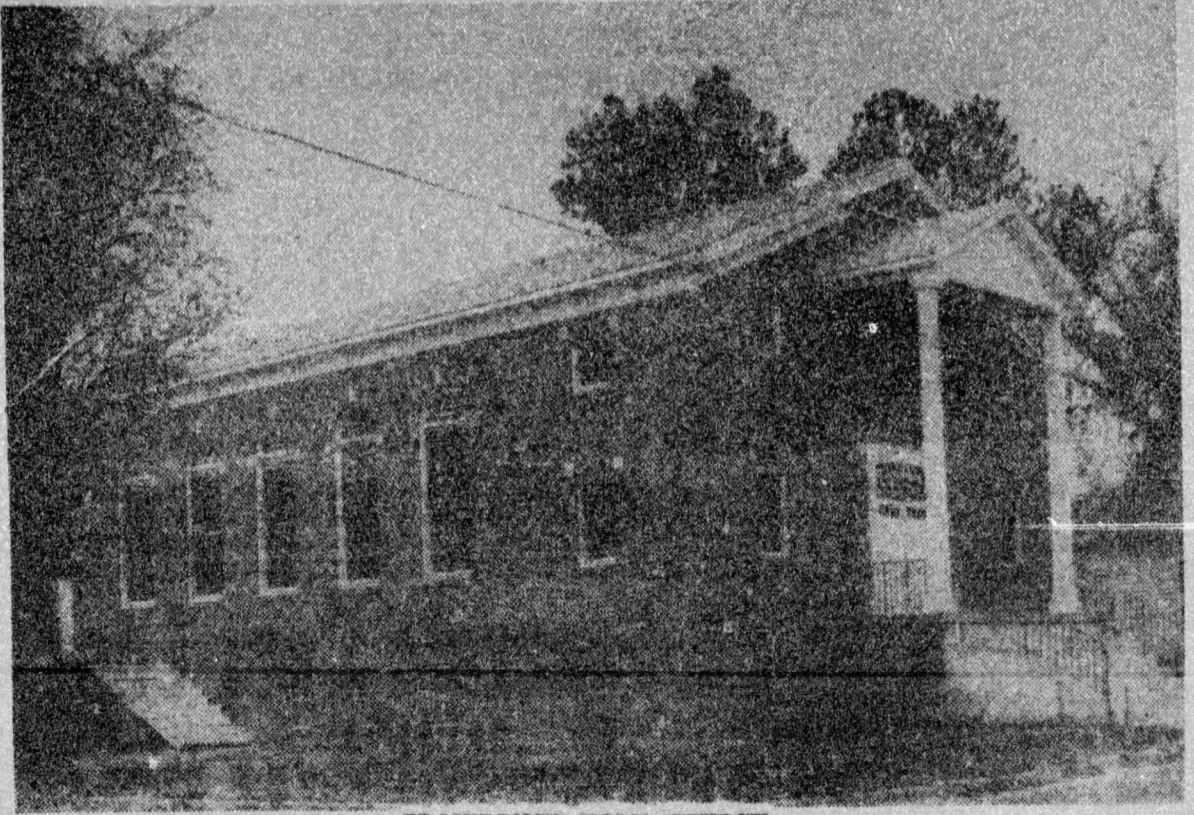
The morning service will be conducted by the Rev. H. B. Clemens of Stokes, N. C. He will be

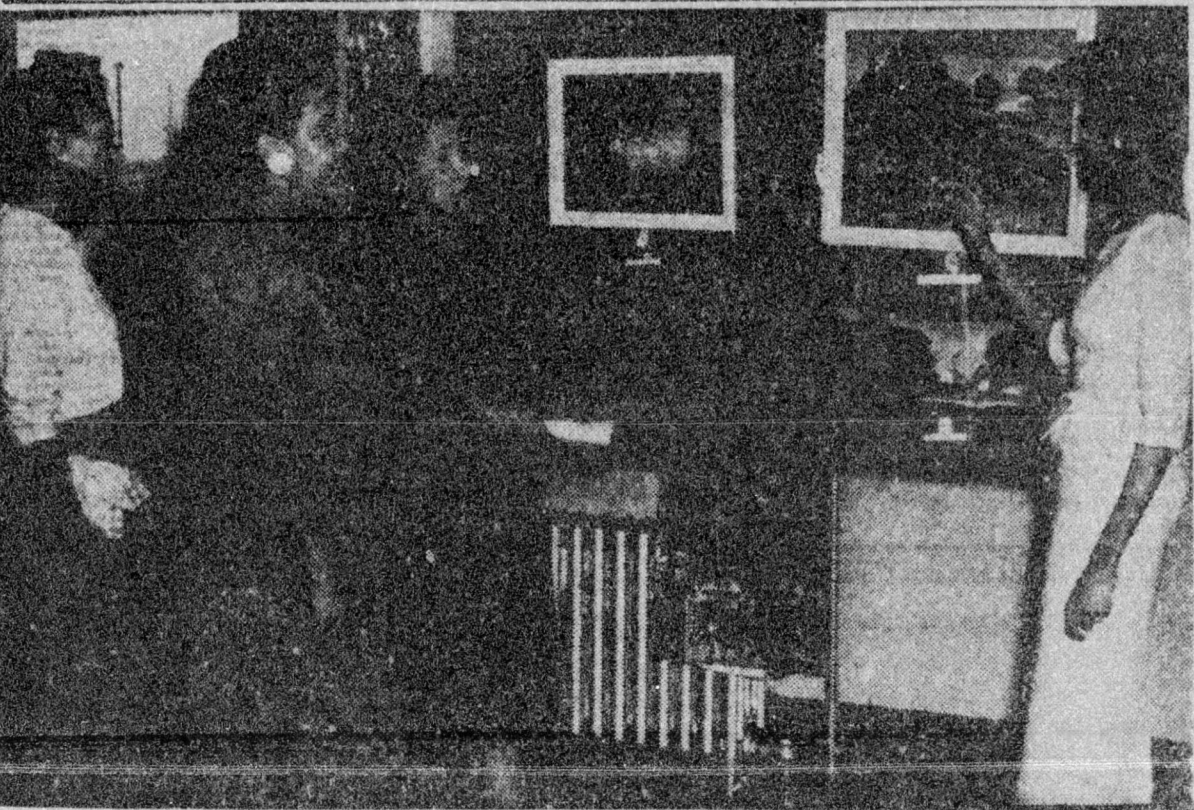
The evening service will feature the praise service, the evening ser-

Thurgood Marshall Speaks At A Jewish Synagogue

DETROIT (AP) — Speaking before packed mixed audiences at Brotherhood Week meetings here at Temple Beth El, Thurgood Marshall, special counsel of the NAACP, declared, "Racial segregation is not a sectional matter. Schools that are segregated by custom or by residential segregation are just as damaging to a child's mind as schools that are segregated by law."

Marshall asserted that there is greater residential segregation in Detroit than in most Southern cities. He pointed out that injustices against minority groups in America are broadcast over Radio Moscow "within minutes after they have occurred."

"We will obtain world peace," Marshall declared, "only when we solve the basic human issues of our civilization. The equality of man is one of those basic issues."

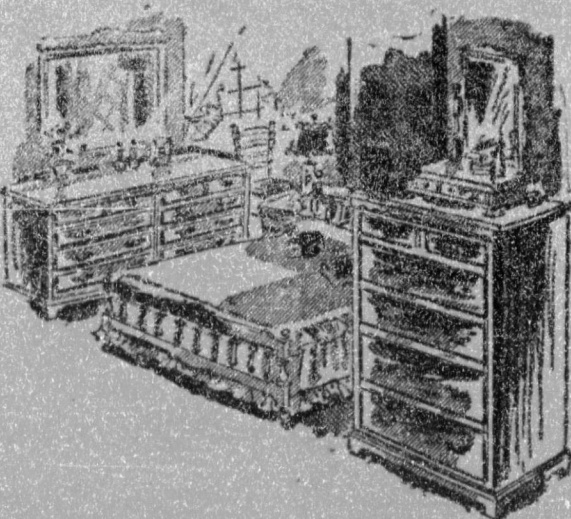
