



State College Answers

QUESTION: At what rete should I sow my burley tobacco bed

ANSWER: Experiments and demonstrations show that onesixth ounce or one level teaspoonful of seed is enough to sow a bed 9 by 100 feeto r 100 square feet or 100 square yards, provided good plant management is carried out. Most burley growers buy one-half or an ounce of seed. If a plant could be grown from each seed in an ounce, there would be enough plants to set 40 acres of Lobacco.

. . . . QUESTION: What's this

"cattle referendum" that I've been hearing about?

ANSWER, It's a self-assessment program which-if it passes when voted upon March 15-will be used to support a promotion program to encourage the production and consumption of beef in North Carolina, Under the set-up. buyers of cattle for slaughter would collect 10 cents per head on all slaughter cattle which sell for as much as \$20 per head. Two-thirds of those voting must approve the plan if it is to go into effect.

QUESTION: Must enres remain 'idle" under the Soil Bank acreage reserve plan?

ANSWER No. Farmers may establish a vegetable cover on the land involved and thereby elimi nate the erosion hazard and at the same time help to control the growth of noxious weeds on the land. As a matter of fact, under the ASC's Agricultural Conserva tion Program, assistance is offered for carrying out such conservation practices. However, the cover crop can't be harvested or grazed if planted on reserve acres.
