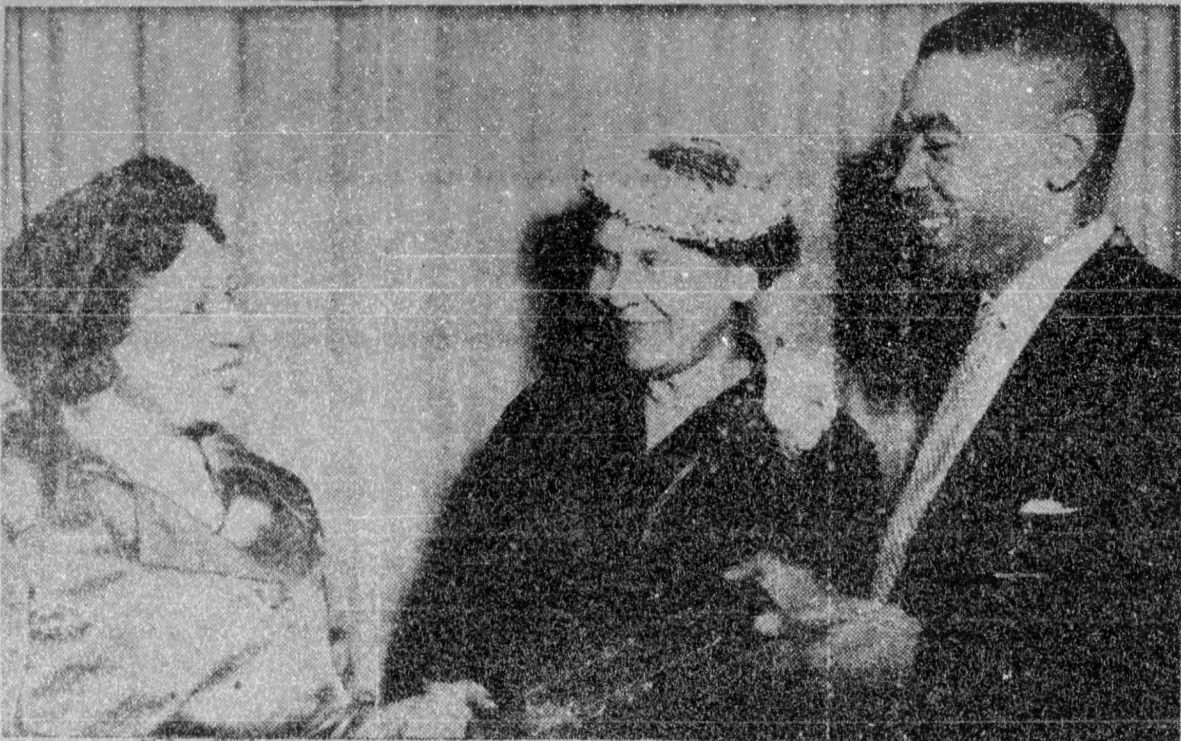


Playwright Spends Time At St. Paul's

LAWRENCEVILLE, Va. — Du-
a S. Lufson, playwright, produc-
er, critic and current director of
the Stagecrafters and Professor of
English at Maryland State College,
Annapolis, Md., recently spent two
days on the Saint Paul's campus
discussing the drama and the the-
ater with interested groups of fac-
ulty and students.
The Saint Paul's College Players
guild was his host on Friday even-
ing in the College Center. Mr.
Lufson spoke on "The Drama in the
Classroom: From the search of his-
torical and literary background to
the creative process." He also
discussed the growth and develop-
ment of the theater, analyzed
the past and present role of
the Negro in the theater and com-
mented critically on recent Broad-
way productions.
He made clear the fact that col-
leges have spawned some of our
best playwrights and plays and
that they must continue to spawn
them if the theater is to develop to
the fullest. Characterizing the the-
ater as "a social, timeless and unlim-
ited art."

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Seventh Day Adventists Organize Seven New Foreign Church Bodies

WASHINGTON, D. C. — (ANP) — The organization of seven new Church units of the Seventh-day Adventist Church was announced this week with the publication of the denomination's 1958 official Yearbook.

The 475-page Yearbook, which lists all Adventist units in 185 countries, lists the new organizations as: The Cambodia-Laos Mission with headquarters at Phnom Penh, Camodge; the Sidang Ad-amerika with headquarters at Singapore.

The Delta Section which comprises a section of Egypt with headquarters at Alexandria, Egypt; the Santa Catrina Mission of South American with headquarters at Mzimba, Nyassaland; the South Nyassa Mission with headquarters at Blantyre, Nyassaland; and the Free State-Natal Conference of Africa with headquarters at Pietermaritzburg, Natal, Africa.

According to H. W. Klaser, statistical director of the world organizations have been formed to keep pace with expanding Church activities in the lands represented.

Mr. Klaser said that Adventist membership is currently growing fastest in Africa. "In Africa today there are as many believers in the Seventh-day Adventist faith as there are in the United States," the official said. There are currently about 310,000 Seventh-day Adventists in the United States with slightly more than 1,000,000 members throughout the world.

The yearbook also lists numerous new medical clinics and dispensaries the Church opened in 1957, and announces the beginning of service of a new medical missionary launch on South America's Mamori River. The launch joins a fleet of nine such vessels already operating on major rivers in South America.

Several new hospitals operated by the Adventist Church are announced in the volume. Two other hospitals are currently under con-

struction in Florida; one in Or-
lando for Negroes and the other
in Palatka.
