Lesson XII — March 23
THE CHURCH AND WORLD EVANGELISM
Matthew 28:18-20; Acts 13:1-3; Romans 1:14-18.

THE PLAN OF THE LESSON
SUBJECT: The Command of Christ to Evangelize the World and Two Illustrations of How the Early Church Obeyed this Command.

I. THE COMMAND OF CHRIST TO EVANGELIZE THE WORLD
Matthew 28:18-20.

1. The claim: supreme authority, v. 18.

2. The command: to disciple, baptize, and teach, vs. 19, 20a.

3. The covenant, v. 20b.

II. THE SENDING FORTH OF MISSIONARIES FROM THE CHURCH AT ANTIOCH, Acts 13:1-3.

1. His intention: to all v. 14.

2. His determination: to preach in Rome, v. 15.

3. The nature of the Gospel he was preaching, vs. 16, 17.

4. The need for this gospel, v. 18.

MATTHEW 28:18. And Jesus came to them and spoke unto them, saying, All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth.

19. Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them unto the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

20. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you: and lo, I am with you always.

ACTS 13:1. Now there were at Antioch, in the church that was there, prophets and teachers, Barnabas, and Simeon that was called Niger, and Lucius of Cyrene, and Manaen the foster-brother of Herod the tetrarch, and Saul.

2. And as they ministered to the Lord, and fasted, the Holy Spirit said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them.

3. Then, when they had fasted and prayed and laid their hands on them, they sent them away.

ROMANS 1:14. I am debtor both to Greeks and to Barbarians, both to the wise and to the foolish.

15. So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to also that are in Rome.

16. For I am not ashamed of the gospel: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth: to the Jew first, and also to the Greek.

17. For therein is revealed a righteousness of God from faith unto faith: as it is written, but the righteous shall live by faith.

18. For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who hinder the truth in unrighteousness.

THE LESSON IN LIFE AND LITERATURE

An entire book might be written on the various interpretations and the influence of the single utterances of our Lord recorded in Matthew 28:18-20. One of the most famous references to it is taken from the diary of David Livingstone, and entry made on the evening of January 14, 1858, when he was forty-three years of age: "Felt much turmoil of spirit in prospect of having all my plans for the welfare of this great region and this teeming population knocked on the head by salvages tomorrow."

But I read that Jesus said, "All power is given unto Me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore, and

Time — The command of our Lord was given in May, A. D. 30. Paul began his first missionary journey about A. D. 47, and the letter to the Romans was written about ten years later, A. D. 57.

Place — The words taken from Matthew were uttered on the Mt. of Olives, before the Ascension. Antioch was a great city located far North in Syria on the Orontes River, while Rome was the
