The Third Annual Literary Forum of North Carolina is scheduled here March 27.

Controversial Yankee - born newspaperman Harry Golden of Charlotte will team up with writers Doris Betts of Sanford and Fred Ross of Badin to talk of the "Writers' Responsibilities to His Times."

The Forum, which originated in the spring of 1956 in Meredith College Auditorium, will be held there again this year.

Moderator will be Sam Ragan, executive editor of The News and Observer-Raleigh Times and author of the Sunday literary column "Southern Accent."

Golden is editor of the singularly witty bi-monthly *Israeli*. And Ross, whose first book, *Jack* son Manafey, earned for him the \$2,400 Houghton-Mifflin award, has completed a sequel expected off the presses this spring.

Mrs. Betts, a prolific writer and winner of the 2,000 Putnam award in 1952, now lives in Sanford, where her husband is an attorney. Known for her novel, "Tall Houses in Winter," and a story collection, "Gentle Insurrection," she holds down a full-time job on the *Sanford Herald* and is also busily writing three novels.

The Forum is sponsored by the Woman's Clubs of Raleigh. Admission is free.

Ghana Press Aide Coming To NCC College
