

Ministers, Three Deacons Take Control Fight To Court

Baptist Church Group To Let Court Settle Issue

MONTGOMERY, Ala.—(AP)—A two-way fight between factions of a Negro church here over which faction should remain in control erupted in court last week.

The legal battle began in Circuit Court on action on a suit brought by Moses Harris, Robert Tyner and Will Brown, deacons of the North Star Baptist church, seeking to oust the pastor, E. L. Newton, the Rev. Newton, meanwhile, claims the members voted to retain him and throw out the deacons.

The three deacons accuse the minister of appearing at church services "in a drunken condition." They say a majority of church members voted last month to remove him.

But the minister shot back that at a meeting called to decide the issue he secured the approval of the members and enough votes to throw out the deacons.

Nearly 1,000 High School Seniors Compete At A&T

GREENSBORO — Nearly 1,000 bright high school seniors from throughout North Carolina are vying for nearly \$11,000 in scholarships being made available at A&T College next fall for entering freshmen.

A total of 3,078 prospective high school graduates submitted to college entrance examinations sponsored by the A&T College Alumni Association, began two years ago. It was the largest group ever to compete under the program.

Dr. F. A. Williams, dean of the A&T Graduate School and chairman of the Alumni Testing Program, stated that the examinations were given at 26 centers, strategically located about the State during the past two weeks. He said announcement of winners will be made within the next 10 days.

The participants, representing the top fourth of their classes, came from a total of 117 accredited high schools. Booker Washington High School of Rocky Mount entered 30 students, the largest of any school in the competition. Ninety-one took the examinations at Charlotte, the largest number at any center. The center at A&T College ran a close second with a total of 88. Nine schools were represented at the Greensboro center.

The tests were administered by 15 professors from the A&T Graduate School.

Among the largest scholarship grants to be offered high scorers in the examinations include: 4 A&T College Alumni Scholarships, \$1,000 each; 3 Smith-Douglas Scholarships, \$500 each; 3 Sears, Roebuck Scholarships, \$100 each; 2 Krieger Foundation Scholarships, \$200 each and several A&T College half-tuition Scholarships.

Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt Honors Aubrey Williams In Montgomery

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, wife of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, sponsored a Testimonial Dinner here Tuesday, for Aubrey Williams, for his outstanding work with the Southern Conference Educational Fund. E. D. Nixon, Negro civic leader, was among the 125 persons attending the dinner.

Williams, chairman of the SED and publisher of Montgomery's controversial Southern Farmer newspaper and an outspoken integrationist.

C. G. Gomillion, president of the Tuskegee Civic Association,

was one of the speakers at the affair.

It was announced at the dinner that the Portrait Exhibit Committee for Americans of Negro Ancestry, is planning to have Mrs. Betsy Graves Revneau, noted artist paint the portraits of 35 distinguished American Negroes, including E. D. Nixon, who started the Montgomery Bus boycott.

This Committee was organized as a sub-committee of the United Negro College Fund. Portraits have been displayed under the auspices of several organizations throughout the United States and are underway to have the portraits exhibited abroad.
