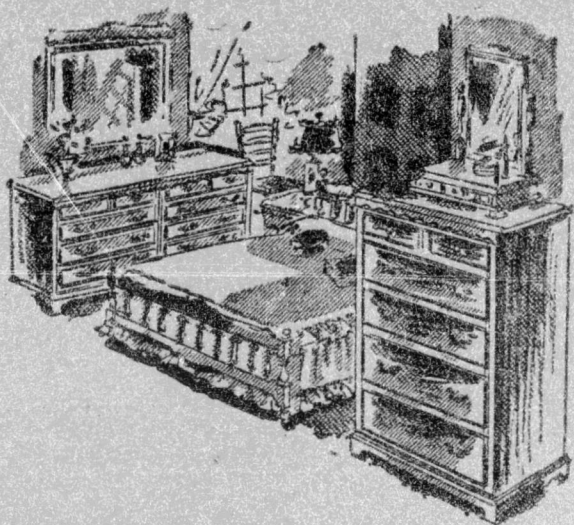

Four-Day UNCF Meeting Ends In Minneapolis

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. — Four days of luncheon, business meetings, dinners, public appearances and tours for 33 presidents of colleges with predominantly Negro enrollments came to an end here recently.

It was the first time in the history of the United Negro College group that all 33 presidents assembled in one city and also the first time that the Twin Cities were hosts.

Highlight of the four-day gathering was a public convocation at Northrop Memorial Auditorium on the University of Minnesota campus Sunday, March 16.

On this occasion, all 33 presidents were introduced from the stage. President Carroll V. Newson of New York University, principal speaker, spoke on "The Challenge to America."

"The Supreme Court decision upon segregation in the schools has not diminished the importance of the Negro college in the American educational system," Dr. Newson told an audience of more than 2,000.

"Recently we are hearing of our disintegrating scientific and technological position when compared to that of the Soviet Union. We are disturbed by the fact that we have grave shortages of manpower on the highest level of competence. It is rather surprising to note that a major aspect of the problem has rarely been mentioned, namely, the fact that millions of children within our vast Negro population have limited opportunity and motivation to develop their latent talents."

"And let us not forget the well-known anthropological truth that the Negro race possesses its proper portion of those who have the native intelligence to become outstanding engineers, scientists, musicians, mathematicians, teachers, doctors and so on."

Speaking for the 33 presidents was Dr. Arthur D. Gray of Talladega College, Alabama. The famous combined Spelman and Morehouse college choir of Atlanta, Ga., sang. Thomas Moore, Minneapolis business man and hotel owner, was chairman and Judson Bemis, industrialist, was honorary chairman. President James L. Morrill of the University of Minnesota greeted the assembly.

Opening night of the Convocation, alumni of the 33 colleges, headed by Judge L. Howard Bennett held a reception at the Prudential Insurance Building on Wayzata Blvd. for the presidents and convocation committee.

11 Per Cent Of Voters Are Negroes

LITTLE ROCK — (ANP) — Approximately 11 percent of the total eligible voters in Arkansas this year are Negroes, according to a report issued last week by the state auditor.

The report, marking the first survey of Negro poll tax holders, shows that out of 553,978 eligible voters, 64,023 are Negroes. It lists a table of eligible voters by county and race, and the number of persons over 21 by county and race.

The total of Negro votes is an approximation, because poll tax numbers of Negroes in 16 counties were estimated. In the other 32 counties, the figure was taken either from official certification or from lists in county poll books. The population figures were obtained from the 1930 census reports.

Out of 292,787 adult Negroes, 58 percent of 64,023 bought poll taxes.
