sical resurrection of Christ. The results of this poll were published in Christianity Today for April 15, 1957. Of 521 scientists addressed, 228 replied, and of this number, 36 affirmed faith in the resurrection and 192 responded in the negative-either that they did not wish to express themselves, or they did not know if Christ rose from the dead, or, they did not be-

lieve that He was raised.

Yet of these 521 scientist, 144 indicate, in Who's Who, their affiliation with some Protestant Church. One would have thought that most of these would have replied in the affirmative, but out of the 88 replies from this group, only 28 acknowledged faith in the resurrecan opinion, and 7 said they did not believe; 12 did not wish to express publication. His book reviews and an opinion, and 7 s aid they did not know. We do not wish to discuss the poll and its tragic revelations, here, except for one significant aspect of the results: No scientist expressing disbelief in the resurrection even hinted that he had carefully examined the records and found they were not dependable.
