History Of Negroes In NC Legislature, US Congress

ris of Shaw University, Raleigh will campaign in Wake County for a seat in the state legislature. To acquaint its readers with the participation of Negroes in the North Carolina Legislature and U.S. Congress, the CAROLINIAN will publish a series of articles dealing with this subject. The fourth of these featured stories appears in this

Nearly sixty years ago three Negroes were elected to the North Carolina Senate during the period

of Fusion politics. They were W. Lee from the Fifth Seanterial District of Edgecombe County, 1897-1899. W. B. Henderson from the Eleventh Senatorial District of Warren and Vance County, 1897-1899, and Thomas O. Fuller from Warren and Vance County, 1899-1901.

This legislator introduced bills designed to increase the efficiency of the public school teachers and their salary, increase public school appropriations, and prevent discrimination in making jury lists, oslist and maintain an insurance department, and the employment of two more physicians for the schools for the blind

In cooperation with his associates, he achieved the incorporation of certain Negro lodges, banking institutions in Edgecombe County, and the Pickford Sanitarium for the treatment of Negro TB patients. Person made a strong bid to bring about the enactment of an anti-lynching law which did not

pass the Senate. Not only this, but his racial awareness led him to propose a bill to prevent discrimination in passenger accomodations, The bill, of course, was not enacted into law. Senator Person was definitely a-

ware of labor problems at the time. Therefore, he introduced measures designed to deal with higher wages and restrictions on hiring convict labor in competition with free lahor. All the measures were defeated, his efforts in their behalf demonstreted that his mind was attun-ed to the real problems of labor. W. B. HENDERSON

Henderson served in the North Carolina Senate from 1897-1899 but he showed little intiative in introducing bills. However, he served on committees of Penal Institutions. Public Roads, Insane Asylum, and Other legislators who intro-

duced bills designed to improve who had been appoined a colonel in the Spanish-American War.

At the time, Fuller was principal of the Shiloh Institute in Warrenton, N. C. Somehow the man was drafted into politics against his wishes, but he received all the votes cast for senator in his district except forty-two which were distributed among three white can-

Fuller entered the Senate on Janpary 4, 1898, and by shewd manipulation his name was called last so that he would "kiss the Bible" upon taking oaths after the whites.

Extreme Democratic sentiment resulted in the failure of his appointment to any committees. The Caucus of the Democrats simply ignored the Negro senator.

In order to clear the jails of prisoners every three months and speed up the judicial process, Fuller introduced a bill which would give the superior court concurrent jurisdiction in all criminal cases. The bill became a law, and Fullthe North Carolina Senate in er's hometown apreciated the measure as one of economy. According

> Fuller also introduced a resolution urging the legislature requesting all congressmen to vote for the ratification of the treaty of peace, which concluded teh Spanish-American War. The measure died in the committee meeting.

Born in Franklinton, N. C., on October 25, 1867, Fuller attended a rivate school at five, entered the Normal School at Franklinton at lifteen, and graduated from Shaw University at the age of twentytwo. Shaw awarded him the M. A. degree when he was 25 years old.
