GOD REVEALS HIS LAW is the subject of this week's lesson and is found in Exodus 19-20; Deuteronomy 5. The printed text is found in Exodus 19:3-8; 20: 1-4, 7-8, 12-17.

The topic for young people and adults is "God's Law in a Nation's Life."

MEMORY VERSE. If ye will obey my voice indeed and keep my covenant, then ye shall be mine own possession from among all people. (Exodus 19:5).

mine own possession from among all peoples: for all the earth is mine.

6. And ye shall be unto a kingdom of priests, and a holy nation. These are the words which thou shalt speak unto the children of Israel.

7. And Moses came and called for the elders of the people, and set before them all these words which Jehovah commanded him.

8. And all the people answered together, and said, All that Jehovah hath spoken we will do. And Moses reported the words of the people unto Jehovah.

EXODUS 20:1. And God spoke all these words, saying:

2. I am Jehovah thy God, who brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the House of Bondage.

3. Thou shalt have no other gods before me.

4. Thou shalt not make unto thee a graven image, nor any likeness of any thing that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth.

5. Thou shalt not take the name of Jehovah thy God in vain: for Jehovah will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain.

6. Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy.

7. Honor thy father and thy mother, that thy days may be long in the land which Jehovah thy God giveth thee.

8. Thou shalt not kill.

9. Thou shalt not commit adultery.

10. Thou shalt not steal.

11. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.

12. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's wife, nor his man-servant, nor his maid servant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor anything that is thy neighbor's. The Lessons in Life and Literature

Most of the catechisms of the Christian Church contain numerous questions and answers based upon Exodus 20. In the Shorter Catechism of the Presbyterian Church, Questions 43 and 44, with answers, read as follows:

Q. What is the preface to the ten commandments?

A. The preface to the ten commandments is in these words: "I am the Lord thy God, which have brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage."

Q. What doth the preface to the ten commandments teach us?

A. The preface to the ten commandments teacheth us, That because God is the Lord, and our God, and Redeemer, therefore we are bound to keep all his commandments.
