Many Farm Shacks May Soon Disappear; USDA Eases Housing Loan Restrictions

WASHINGTON, D. C. — (AP) — Many farm shacks may soon disappear as the stepped-up farm housing loan program of the U. S. Department of Agriculture gets underway.

As an anti-recession move, the Department's Farmers Home Administration is making it easier for farm owners, now living in unsatisfactory dwellings, to obtain loans to provide adequate housing for their families.

A farm owner who produces at least \$400 worth of products for sale or home use may now qualify for a housing loan from the Farmers Home, provided he meets other standard eligibility requirements, including inability to obtain adequate credit elsewhere. Formerly an eligible applicant had to own a farm that produced a more substantial part of the operator's annual cash income.

Loans may be obtained to build, improve, or repair farm homes and other essential farm buildings, as well as to provide water for the farmstead and household. The rate of interest is four percent and the repayment period 33 years.

Last year the Farmers Home made loans to 11 colored farm fam-

ilies to build, repair, or modernize their homes. And since establishment of the agency 21 years ago more than 10,000 colored families have not only received loans to provide themselves with better homes, but also to buy, enlarge, or improve farms of their own.

Typical of the farmers who have received such loans in recent years is Percy Everson of Disputants, Va. He obtained a loan two years ago to build a modern, eight-room house for his family of seven, dig a deep well, build a barn, and fence and improve his pastures.
