HOW TO COOK WITH BUDWEISER



BARBECUED HAMBURGER
Brown hamburger patties on both sides in a little fat. Add barbecue sauce and simmer 10 minutes. Serve on toasted hamburger rolls.

BARBECUE SAUCE
1/4 cup Budweiser 2 tablespoons sugar
1/4 cup ketchup 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
2 tablespoons vinegar Salt and pepper to taste
Combine all ingredients mix well. Pour over hamburgers. Yield: 6 servings.

HAM COOKED WITH BUDWEISER
1 (8 pound) ham 1 tablespoon dry mustard
Cloves 2 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed 2 cups Budweiser
Cover ham with cold water. Bring slowly to boiling point. Simmer for three hours. Remove from water. Skin. Score fat in diamond shapes, and stud with cloves. Make a paste of sugar, mustard and vinegar. Four over ham.
Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 1 1/2 hours basting frequently with Budweiser. Approximate yield: 24 portions.

GRILLED FISH FILLETS, LOCKE OBER
2 lbs fillet of cod 2 teaspoons paprika
Salad or olive oil 2 teaspoons dry mustard
3 cups soft, grated, bread crumbs 4 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
2 cups diced American cheese 1 cup Budweiser
Cut cod fillets in serving size pieces. Brush on both sides with salad or olive oil. Roll in bread crumbs. Broil at 350 F., 15 minutes, turning once. Meanwhile make sauce as follows: Combine cheese, paprika, mustard, Worcestershire sauce and Budweiser. Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally until cheese melts. Whip smooth. Arrange fillets on platter, garnish with lemon wedges, then pour sauce into serving dish. Yield: 6 servings.

RAINBOW MELON CUP
2 cups watermelon balls 1 cup cantaloupe balls
1 cup honeydew melon balls 1 1/2 cups (12 oz.) Budweiser
Place melon balls in shallow pan. Add Budweiser. Chill several hours. Arrange in serving dishes. Add a little fresh cold Budweiser to each dish. Yield: 8 portions.
