## **HOW TO COOK WITH** BUDWEISER



BARBECUED HAMBURGER

Brown hamburger patties on both sides in a little fat. Add barbecue sauce and simmer 10 minutes. Serve on toasted hamburger rolls.

BARBECUE SAUCE

M cup Budweiser 2 tablespoons sugar % oup ketchup 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce 2 inblespoons vinegar Salt and pepper to taste Combine all ingredients mix well. Pour over hamburgers Yield: 6 servings.

HAM COOKED WITH BUDWEISER

1 (S pound) ham I tablespoon dry mustard 2 tablespeons vinegar % sup brown sugar, firmly packed 2 cups Budweiser Cover ham with cold water. Bring slowly to boiling point Simmer for three hours. Remove from water, Skin. Score fat in diamond shapes, and stud with cloves. Make a paste of sugar, mustard and vinegar. Pour over ham.

Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 11/2 hours basting frequently with Budweiser. Approximate yield: 24 portlons.

BROILED FISH FILLETS, LOCKE OBER

2 lbs fillet of cod Salad or olive oil 3 cups soft, grated, bread crumbs

2 teaspoons paprika 2 teaspoons dry mustard 4 teaspoons Worcestershire

2 cups diced American cheese 1 cup Budweiser Cut cod willets in serving size pieces. Brush on both sides with salad or olive oil. Roll in bread crumbs. Broil at 350 F., 15 minutes, turning once Meanwhile make sauce as follows: Combine cheese, paprika, mustard, Worcestershire sauce and Budweiser. Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally until cheese melts. Whip smooth. Arrange fillets on platter, garnish with lenion wedges, then pour sauce into serving dish. Yield: 6
