BOSTON — Senator John F. Kennedy (Dem., Mass.) has congratulated the United Beauty School Owners and Teachers Association for their support to Bethune-Cookman College, Daytona Beach, Florida in honor of its founder, the late Mrs. Mary McCloud Bethune.

Mrs. Bethune, a nationally known Negro educator, was appointed by the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt as one of the administrators of the famed program of the National Youth Administration.

The organization and association, composed of Negro beauty school owners and teachers, are holding their 3-day national convention at the Hotel Vendôme in Boston. Over 1000 delegates from 44 states are in attendance.

Woman's Day Observed At A & T College

GREENSBORO — A challenge for the women of today to become the "human engineers" of tomorrow as one of their major contributions toward solving the world's problems was given by Dr. Ruth E. Quaries, Baltimore, Md., in her address highlighting the seventh annual Woman's Day service at A & T College last Sunday morning.

Dr. Quaries, who took the title of her address from this year's theme: "The Women: What We Are Today and What We Hope To Be Tomorrow," is coordinator of student personnel services at Morgan State College. She is a native Carolinian and was introduced by Mrs. Onida D. Benton, dean of women.

Tracing the role of women in American life, Dr. Quaries said that the world is accepting the view that men and women have now arrived at the point where they must work together rather than compete against each other for status.

Whether women stop going to college or whether their numbers increase, she said, "it is clear that they are involved in three major roles in American life."

In the first place, women are now and will be tomorrow, community and civic workers, churchwomen, children's work, hospitals, civic leagues, etc., all depend upon women. Secondly, women are gainfully employed—nearly one of every three workers is a woman.

Third, and most important, women are homemakers. Women still think in terms of home and family for although the time for keeping a house may have decreased, the responsibility for home and child care has not. Women are marrying younger (while in college) and the number of children is increasing."

More than 1,000 mothers, alone, are expected for the program scheduled for the full day, W. H. Gamble, dean of men and chairman of the committee on arrangements, told reporters this week that responses to invitations, sent out a few days ago, are arriving at a rapid pace. "We are pretty sure," he said, "that this will be our biggest year."

Other sons and daughters of high school age and the fathers are also being invited. The idea, a turn around from the usual when students formerly went home to see their parents, was begun some 18 years ago. It has grown in popularity year by year.
