Sam Cooke Picking 'Em In; Says All Tours Are Alike

CHICAGO — (AP) — Whether it's a tour on the gospel circuit or singing before a rock and roll crowd, it's all the same according to veteran gospel singer Sam Cooke who catapulted into the pop field last fall when his "You Send Me" disc hit the million sales mark.

Now a headliner with Irving Berlin's show, the modest Cooke is the hottest attraction in show business today. As records and TV have been the only mediums that he's been heard and seen on since his rise to fame crowds are turning out in droves for him on this tour.

"The transition from gospel to pop tunes was easy," he said in his dressing room at the Opera House here when the attraction played a none night stand. "I find crowds are the same the country over as long as you give them what they want."

"When I first started singing pop tunes I wondered how my former associates and fans would re-

act. But they accepted me as I see them all sitting on the front row applauding me, just like they did when I was with the Soul Stirrers."

A polished performer, who knows how to handle a crowd, Cooke will earn an estimated \$250,000 this year. Two years ago his 12 months

income was \$20,000, which is considered high on the gospel circuit because they work only three or four nights a week and usually at small churches whose 300 seating capacity can only yield about \$400 nightly to any group of singers.

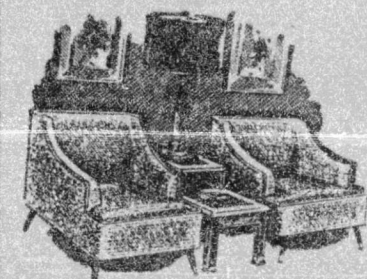

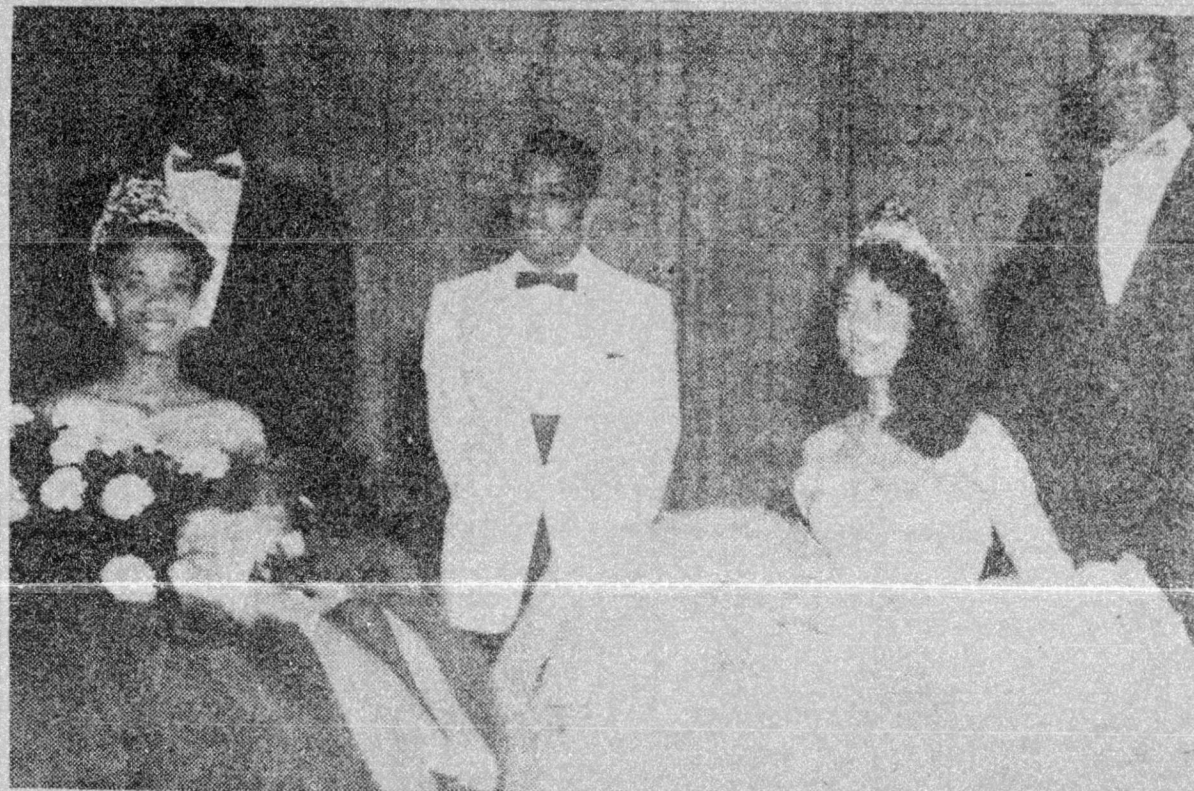

WAKE FOREST — Miss Nellie Purefoy, a Junior at Johnson C. Smith University of Charlotte, recently entertained her audience from the topic "National Christian College Day and Its Place in the Educational Program of America."

Thus it was for this cause that she was so honored and permitted to speak as a representative of a Christian Education and one of the 41 such institutions supported by the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A.

The following are several of the highlights cited by the speaker. No doubt one recalls that the first times the early settlers did after establishing their homes and churches was to build schools to train men and women for leadership in the community and the nation. Such training included ministers, missionaries, teachers and various vocations of life. Therefore about two thirds of our colleges and universities were founded by church groups and are known as church related colleges.

After such wise procedure the church realized the necessity of investing heavily in education in order that strong worthy leadership could prevail and by understanding the nature of man, God, prayer, the church and the relation of Church and State, students would be amply armed with tools in making their own decisions, thereby, having a broader view of education and cherish the history of all mankind or humanity.

In order to produce such leadership, the related college endeavors to develop community consecration under God's leadership.

In her closing remarks, Mrs. Purefoy stated it was indeed important that as Christian people of members of the Christian Church, one should become more aware and deeply concerned not to lose the precious values which over 500 Christian Colleges have to offer and expressed her deep gratitude to Johnson C. Smith University for choosing her as a representative of one of the Presbyterian colleges which is typical of the small Christian college.
