Final Count Shows Dr. N. Harris Garnered 3,094 In Primary Here

Nelson H. Harris, newcomer in the political arena for a seat in the House of Representatives from Wake County, made a creditable showing in spite of the fact that the incumbents had a field day and were elected to office in the May 31 Democratic Primary.

The official tally of votes indicated that Nelson Harris received 3,094 votes, many of which were cast by white constituents.

Harris, a Shaw University graduate, entered the race for this primary and became the first Negro to run for a seat in the House of Representatives since Foster politics in 1899. He was backed in his campaign by a Committee of Friends.

THE FOLLOWING MEN all incumbents, won their seats in the House of Representatives.

W. Bentley Womble 10,036; Philip R. Whitley, 9,149; and 9,293 went to W. C. Harris.

In the senate race, a possible runoff will be held. The two men involved are John Jordan, who polled

7,175 votes, and Thomas P. Ellis, who received 5,560 votes.

Judge William Y. Bickett, incumbent, won reelection for the judgeship with a count of 11,068 votes to

William T. Hatch's 6,834 votes. Russell Nipper, the incumbent for Wake County Superior Court

The padlocking order was signed by Judge Henry McKinnon, Jr. of Lumberton, who was holding a term of civil court in the city.

Sheriff's deputies Robert H. Linton, Lewis Waters and Lester W. Kelly served the order on Mack Burch, operator of the business.

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Atty. General Sees Danger In Bypassing

PEMBROKE — State Atty. Gen. Malcolm B. Seawell says that for North Carolina to close its schools as a weapon against enforced racial integration would be suicide.

"I know that if we in North Carolina should close our schools we would cut our own throats—economically, politically and spiritually," Seawell said. "Our progress would come to an end."

Seawell spoke at commencement exercises Monday at Pembroke State College. He noted that the U. S. Supreme Court cannot order the state to maintain its public schools.

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Church Bonus Money Rules

All purchase slips or receipts presented to your church must come from stores advertising in the CAROLINIAN.

Each week carries a date in the Bonus Money period. Purchases eligible must come from the store during the week the "ad" appears.

No purchase slips representing a business should be submitted. All receipts must come from individual purchases.

All churches in Raleigh and Wake County are eligible. All purchase slips must bear the name of the store from which the purchase was made.

All purchase slips should be submitted in the name of the church and should be in the office of the CAROLINIAN the Monday following close of Bonus period.

In order that smaller churches may have an equal opportunity to share in the Bonus Money the following regulation is expedient. No church of over 200 members will be awarded 1st Bonus Money consecutively. If a church of 200 or more members receive 1st Bonus Money after the first period, it would have to wait until the third Bonus period to be presented for an award again, except where a church has 200 or less members, then it could win a Bonus award consecutively. However, this does not mean that second and third awards cannot be sought consecutively. Consequently every church group has the opportunity to secure an award every period.

No purchase of over \$34 from any one merchant during a week can be counted. There is a rebate of \$5 per person a week for grocery purchases. In the event of the same amount of purchases by more than one entry, the award will be divided.

Weekly purchase totals should be shown on each packet and total placed on the outside of the envelope carrying the period's entry, along with name and address.

Bonus money earners will be announced in the issue following the closing of each period.

All entries remain the property of THE CAROLINIAN. All tallying is final when the names of the Bonus Money earners are announced in THE CAROLINIAN, and no responsibility is accepted by this newspaper beyond that point.

No receipts from banks will be considered, except payment on mortgages.
