## Fayetteville Prexy, Wife Studying At Harvard U.

FAYETTEVILLE — Dr. Rudolph Jones, president of Fayetteville State Teachers College and his wife Mrs. Mildred Jones, have gone back to college, themselves. This time to Harvard University.

They have been selected to attend the forthcoming Fourth Annual Institute for College Presidents and their Wives, held at Harvard University during the period June 17-25.

The Institute is sponsored by the Carnegie Corporation of New York and the Association of American Colleges and is conducted by the Harvard Institute for College and University Administrators. Attendance is limited to 36 presidents of four-year colleges who were appointed since July 1, 1955.

During their week of classes the presidents will examine a series of school administrative problems presented in written case method form, with primary emphasis on the decision-making function of the president. The presidents' wives will participate as well. They will also study many of the cases put to their husbands.

The second part of the program will consist of even talks by leaders in the field of education and opportunities to discuss with these

experienced presidents and their wives the problems under consideration.

## First Negro Named Grand K Of C Knight

NEW YORK — (AP) — A Negro Catholic convert of Brooklyn has been named Grand Knight of St. Columba council, Knights of Columbus, it was announced Thursday.

He is James L. Pierce who, when he assumes office on July 1 for the 1958-59 year, will be the first Negro to head the council or hold such an office throughout the Catholic national order.

Pierce won the distinction after several years of outstanding service in the various ranks of the council. He served for three years as deputy grand knight, and is a lieutenant in the honor guard. He has long been active in parish and diocesan activities, being vice-president and diocesan union delegate of his parish's Holy Name society. He is also vice-president of the local Catholic Interracial council.

Pierce entered the Knights of Columbus through his parish with the recommendation of the Rev. Joseph Grellman, assistant pastor of St. Gregory's parish and chaplain of St. Columba council. St. Gregory's is a mixed parish, having set the pattern for integration when its neighborhood composition underwent a change 10 years ago. The council has also joined in the move toward racial integration.

Pierce, his wife and two sons have lived in the parish for many years. He is employed by the New York State workmen's compensation board.

## It's Easy To Build More Shelf Space



More shelf space is the best answer to the where-to-put-it problem in the majority of homes. Fortunately, anyone who can handle the ordinary hand tools can build a set of shelves. It's a good beginner's project for the inexperienced home handyman.

Lumber dealers can usually supply 3/4-inch pine shelving in stock lengths of 8, 10 or 12 feet, and in 2, 10 or 12-inch widths. You can put the boards together with finishing nails, but you will get stronger joints with screws. For a workmanlike job, countersink nails with a nail set, or set screws in shallow, drilled holes. Fill in over the heads of nails or screws with Plastic Wood. Use the Plastic Wood again to fill any cracks or gaps.

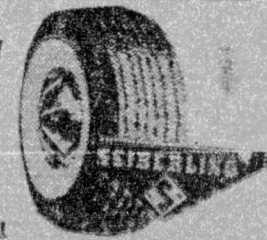

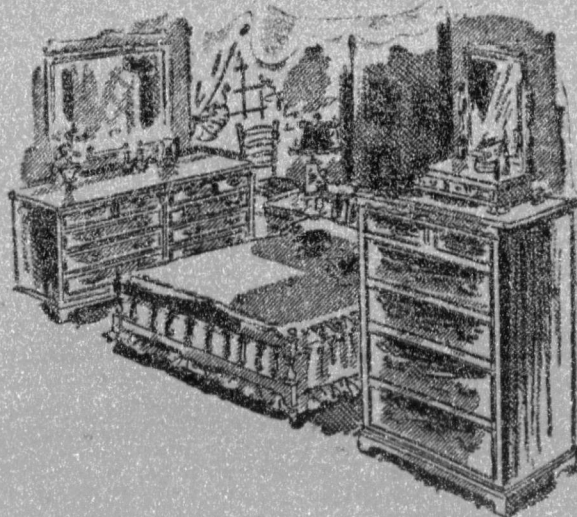

## "Negroes Putting Vote Ahead Of Education," Says Bishop Oxnam

WASHINGTON — Bishop G. Odell Oxnam of the white Methodist church stated last week that Negroes are beginning to put the

right to vote ahead of school integration. The statement was made before delegates of the Baltimore annual conference meeting on the Western Maryland College campus recently.

Colored people of America, he said, are beginning to understand that the right to vote is "even more fundamental" than integration. "When the vote is there, the politicians are going to think in terms of proper treatment of Negroes."

The Washington bishop pointed to the transportation system in New Orleans which was recently integrated. Segregation was abolished on the streets and buses with "nothing happening" due to the fact that Negroes in that city have the right to vote and the "politicians know it."

Negroes are now realizing that politicians will accept integration more gracefully when the power of the Negro vote is sensed, concluded the Methodist bishop. He expressed great disappointment that "no strong Methodist voice" has been heard in the South on this issue.

## Junior Books Collection On Exhibit At Durham Library

DURHAM — Six hundred new and recent children's books by America's foremost authors and illustrators, with an occasional contribution from other lands will be exhibited in the James E. Shepard Memorial Library June 18, according to Dr. Benjamin F. Smith, Librarian.

The books are in thirty-two subject categories and cover all grades from kindergarten through high school. Both fiction and non-fiction are represented. The exhibit will be open to the public daily from 3:00 - 5:00 p. m. and will last through June 21.

The thirty-two subjects the exhibit covers include: adventure, aeronautics, animals, the arts, biography, careers, classics, conversation, exploration, fairy tales and folklore, fiction (with seventeen sub-divisions), foreign lands, games and parties, geography, history, hobbies and activities, Indians, intercultural relations, inventions, languages, nature, picture books, pioneer life, religion,

science, ships, social studies, sports, story books, transportation and verse.

The purpose of this service is to make available to schools and libraries a completely representative collection of junior library books in organized exhibit form and thus make it possible for busy teachers and librarians, with a minimum expenditure of time and effort, to do an informed and intelligent job of book selection. Parents and the general public are expected to find the exhibit well worth their time and attention.

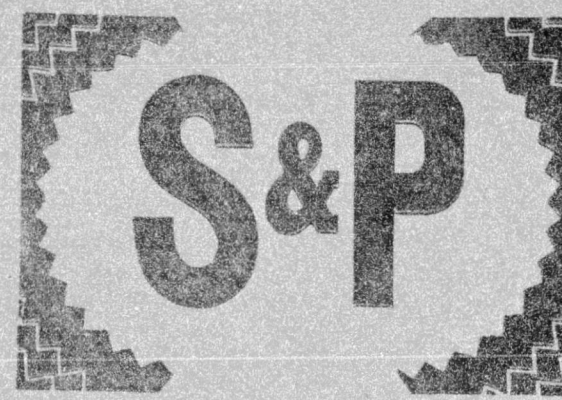
