NO REQUESTS AT HIGH POINT
HIGH POINT — The City of High Point apparently will maintain its racially segregated public school system for at least one more year. Schools Supt. Dean B. Pruitt announced Saturday that no Negro students have requested reassignment to white schools here for the next school term.
School officials in nearby Greensboro have 19 such requests before them. In Charlotte and Mecklenburg County, at least 26 pupils have asked for admission to white schools, while nine such requests are before school authorities at Winston-Salem.

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Dist. Judge Refuses To Rescind Order In Little Rock; Case Goes To Higher Court

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LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — U. S. District Judge Harry J. Lemley Monday refused to stay his own order delaying school integration here for 2 1/2 years.
The federal jurist indirectly advised the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to try for the stay in a higher court than his.
Attorney Willey Branton, who represented the NAACP, said he would take the cue.
Judge Lemley denied Branton's motion Monday morning after hearing six minutes of oral argument and recessing court to write the opinion.
"From a practical standpoint to grant this motion and stay the enforcement of our judgment would to a large extent nullify our order," the judge declared.

Rev. Fisher Buried Near Chester, Pa.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — Funeral services for the Rev. George A. Fisher, 62, rector of the St. Ambrose Episcopal Church, Raleigh, for many years, were held at the Church of the Crucifixion here Tuesday morning at 11 a. m. Burial followed in the family plot near Chester, Pa.
Rev. Fisher died suddenly Friday afternoon in Philadelphia.
At the time of his death, the Rev. Mr. Fisher was serving as rector of the Church of the Crucifixion, a post he had occupied since December of 1957.
Rev. Fisher was well-known in Raleigh and the eastern section of the state for his religious and civic work.

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4 Leaders Talk With President

WASHINGTON — President Dwight D. Eisenhower met with four Negro leaders Monday and was informed that a court order delaying school integration in Little Rock, Ark. outraged the Negro race. They said they received a sympathetic reception, but no promises from the chief executive.
A spokesman for the group told Eisenhower that Saturday's ruling by U. S. District Judge Harry Lemley, postponing integration for 2 1/2 years, "is being construed rightly or wrongly as a green light to lawless elements in their defiance of federal authority." Attorney General William F. Rogers was also present at the meeting.
The White House visitors were A. Phillip Randolph, a vice-president of the American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations and president of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters; Lester B. Granger, executive secretary of the National Urban League; the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., of Montgomery, Ala., president of the Southern Leadership Conference and leader of the Montgomery Bus boycott; and Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.
For about a year the leaders have been trying to see the President. The latest request

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They've Done Me Wrong, King Says

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Clennon King, 37-year-old controversial Negro professor, who was hustled off to the Whitefield state mental hospital after attempting to enroll at the all-white University of Mississippi, shook the dust of Mississippi off his feet hurriedly last Thursday and boarded a plane for Albany, Ga., his native city.
His parting words to reporters were, "They know they've done me wrong."
He is returning to Albany "for a change in scenery." He did not say when, if ever, he would return, but did say:
"I don't want to stay in Mississippi if I'm not wanted. I haven't been treated right in Mississippi."
King was released last Wednesday from the hospital, in which he had been held for two weeks, to undergo sanative tests. However, hospital authorities, upon his release, refused to make immediately available the results of the tests.
King was arrested on the university campus, after officials charged he went berserk while attempting to become the first Negro to enter the all-white state institution. He was forcefully removed from the campus by state highway patrolmen, held incommunicado.

African Woman Legislator To Address NAACP Meet

NEW YORK — Giving an international aspect to the 49th annual convention of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in Cleveland, July 8-13 will be the appearance of one of the leading women of Africa, Madame Ella Kobia Gulama, a member of the House of Representatives of Sierra Leone, a British colony on the West Coast of the continent.
Mime. Gulama, who is Paramount Chief of the Kaiyamba Chiefdom in the Moyamba District of Sierra Leone, and NAACP Executive Secretary Roy Wilkins will address the closing session of the convention in the Public Auditorium on Sunday afternoon, July 13.
The Spingarn Medal will be presented to Mrs. L. C. Bates and the nine Negro children enrolled in Central High School at Little Rock, Ark., by Dr. William E. Stevenson, president of Oberlin College, at the Friday night session, July 11.
Thurgood Marshall, director-counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, will also address that session.
The Wednesday night meeting will be devoted to a discussion of political parties and civil rights with Senators Paul Douglas (D. Ill.) and Jacob Javits (R. N. Y.) as the speakers. The keynote address will be delivered by Dr. Channing H. Tobias, chairman of the Association's Board of Directors, at the opening session of the convention on Tuesday night, July 8.
A pre-convention conference of NAACP lawyers will be held on July 7.

Two Private Schools Set For Virginia

ARLINGTON, Va. — A group seeking to establish a white private school system here to replace any integration — closed public schools is planning to set up two model schools early next month to demonstrate how the proposed private educational system would work.
Jack Rathbone, acting secretary of the tenth district Fundamental Education Organization, said tentative arrangements had been made to equip the schools, one in a six room house and the other in a store building and with television sets for a closed-circuit television teaching system. Miss Gibson Defends At Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England — Miss Althea Gibson opened defense of her Wimbledon championship Tuesday by whipping Miss Mary Hellyer of Australia as most of the favorites advanced.
Misses Maria Bueno of Brazil and Christine Truman of England, both teenagers, ranked with the 30-year-old Harlem whiz as the great powers of women's tennis, also won easily on another rainy day.
Seven of the twelve women from the United States survived the playing.
Miss Gibson, top-seeded player, who was beaten by Miss Truman in the Wightman Cup play, eliminated Miss Hellyer with the loss of only two games, 6-0, 6-2 in a second-round match.

"Catfish" Cole Attacks Negroes, Jews, Hodges

LITTLE RIVER, S. C. — Ku Klux Klan Wizard James "Catfish" Cole, who has announced for governor of South Carolina as a write-in candidate, says he can beat Donald S. Russell, but can defeat Ernest F. Hollings "Ten times easier."
Cole, of Marion, at a Klan rally here Saturday night, bitterly attacked Hollings, North Carolina Gov. Luther Hodges, labor leader Walter Reuther, Negroes and Jews, and the town administration of ocean Drive Beach.
Cole, who is out under appeal on a conviction of inciting a riot in Marion, N. C., last January, said after tomorrow Hodges could not extradite him. "Because the people of South Carolina would be using him as governor."
Speaking to some 35-40 Klansmen at the rally, he said he had filed a complaint with the FBI in Columbia against Ocean Drive Mayor, Council and city lawyers and "when I get through with them they'll all be in jail."
Cole attacked the Ocean Drive administration for their refusal last month to allow his group to hold a rally at the beach. The Council had refused to let the Klan come in after vacationers began cancelling weekend reservations.

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
