70 Foreign Students At Hampton, Va.

HAMPTON, Va.—Hampton Institute was host to a group of 70 foreign exchange students on its campus July 3 and 4 under the auspices of the Student Christian Association, according to an announcement by the Rev. James M. Jones, SCA director of Hampton Institute.

Representing 18 countries, these students have spent their past school year with an American family in the New York area. They are part of 1932 students who come from Europe, Central and South America, the near and far East under the sponsorship of the American Field Service to live with an American family while attending their senior year in a U. S. high school.

Their stay at Hampton was part of a three-week tour which the American Field Service provides for the students at the end of their school year. The students on this tour will travel through eight states before joining other groups in Washington, D. C. where they will be received by President Eisenhower and congressional leaders.

The American Field Service hopes that the students, who represent 18 countries, will gain a broader view of American ways and life and that the 50,000 American people who meet these students will also gain understanding of other cultures through meeting these teenagers.

Knoxville Prof Gets His Ph. D.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn.—Dr. Joseph L. Harrison, professor of biology at Knoxville College, received the Doctor of Philosophy degree in zoology at the commencement of the State University of Iowa, Iowa City, He and his family returned to Knoxville this week.

His dissertation is entitled "Hypo Plastic Modifications of the Telencephalon following Unilateral Excision of the Nucleus Basalis of Rana Pipiens Embryos." It is to be published in the Journal of Experimental Zoology (date to be announced later).

Dr. Harrison was a graduate assistant to Dr. J. J. Kallros, chairman of the Department of Zoology at Iowa, from 1956-57. From 1957-58 his work was financed partly by a grant from National Medical Fellowship, Inc., through funds appropriated by the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis.

He is now a member of the Society of the Sigma Xi (professional fraternity), American Association for Advancement of Science, Gamma Alpha Research Fraternity, and was nominated for membership in the National Zoological Society.

A native of Baton Rouge, La., Dr. Harrison did his undergraduate work at Leland College. He received his M.S. degree from Iowa in 1952 and has also done graduate work at the University of Tennessee here in Knoxville. In addition to his four years at Knoxville College he has taught at St. Phillips College, San Antonio, Texas, and at Leland College.

Bishop S. G. Spottswood Comments On Judge Lemley's Little Rock Decision

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio.—Bishop S. G. Spottswood, Washington, D. C. Chairman, Board of Bishops, A. M. E. Zion Church, said here Sunday that the fact is that U. S. District Judge Harry J. Lemley did not ban the cause of desegregation when he granted Central High School, Little Rock, Ark., a breathing spell.

The prelate had the following to say, "The granting of a breathing spell by Judge Lemley yesterday, in my opinion, is another feeble gesture toward the dying monster of discrimination. We have had a fairly long breathing spell for the 33 years since the Emancipation Proclamation.

"The Supreme Court has spoken—Democracy hangs in the balance around the world and if we do not fulfill the Court's interpretation of constitutional

desegregation, of our public school system, we may lose the fight to retain the balance of our public school system, we may lose the fight to retain the 'balance of power' in the battle of Democracy versus Communism."

The bishop has long since been in the forefront in the battle for first class citizenship for all the peoples of America and has been outspoken against the evils that minorities have had to endure. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the NAACP and has represented the militant organization on many occasions.

He has been in Youngstown since Wednesday presiding over the 43rd Annual Session of the Ohio Conference, which met at First Memorial A. M. E. Zion Church. He has charge of the 7th Episcopal District of which the Ohio Conference is a part.

Stay Trial Of 9 Youths On Change Of Venue Plea

PHILADELPHIA.—(AP)—The nine boys accused of killing a Korean student in Philadelphia last month may be tried outside the city if the State Supreme court rules that local citizens have been so aroused by accounts of the vicious crime that it will be impossible to choose an impartial jury.

The possibility of an out-of-town trial loomed even greater on Tuesday when Chief Justice Charles Alvin Jones of the State Supreme court held up all action in the trials of the nine youths.

Justice Jones acted after receiving an appeal from the attorney for one of the boys, Alphonse Borum, 19.

Atty. Cecil R. Moore requested that the chief justice grant a change of venue—a location for the trial outside of Philadelphia—because he be-

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
