Earl Brown **Blasts Race** Tag In Slum

NEW YORK (ANP) -Councilman Earl Brown got the city's slum clearance committee to drop racial designation on tenant-relocation records after he attacked the practice on the floor of the city council last week.

Following Brown's protest, the council unanimously adopted a resolution calling on the slum committee and other related agencies to discontinue relocation practices requiring tenants to list race, religion and national origin.

The protest also brought action from George E. Spargo, assistant chairman of the slum committee. Informed of the resolution, Spargo ordered the "race" tag section deleted from the forms at once. He said, "it should never have been there in the first place."

Brown, Democratic candidate for congress and opponent of incumbent Adam Clayton Powell, had produced an official relocation record of the "Office of Committee on Sium Clearance" that required occupants of sites being cleared for slum clearance to list their races.
