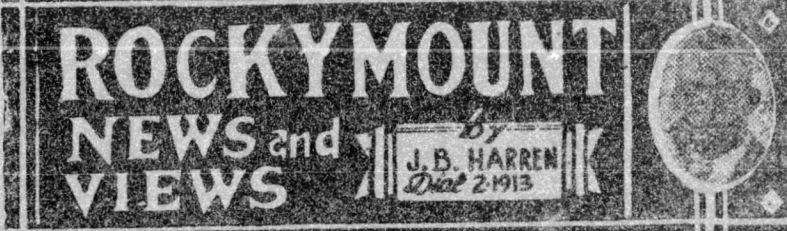
AT SEABOARD, N. C.

TEENAGERS ALIKE EVERYWHERE

ROCKY MOUNT — We are indebted to Edward Neal Riner, staff writer, Rocky Mount Telegram, for the title "Teenagers Alike Everywhere" and the following lines of his story about the 64 foreign students of many nationalities who visited eastern Carolina and spent three days in Rocky Mount as part of their get-acquainted-with-America good-will tour.

"They (teenagers) chew gum, smoke cigarettes, like soft drinks, wear chemises and bop."

"They have a good time and never seem to worry. They speak English, they are teen agers, in fact they are just like any American teen agers with their moods, expressions and habits."

This was, in fact, the summation Riner gave of the 64 students from 21 foreign countries who are returning to their respective lands with vivid impressions of America — where they have completed a year of schooling under auspices of the American Friends Service student exchange program in the interest of international relations.

It was observed that there were no students from the darker races or nations listed among visitors. Neither do we have knowledge of any effort to have these students meet with similar persons of the colored race. This, we think, was a mistake.

If we are really in earnest about "showing-off" our wonderful America why not cut out all of her citizenry on the deal? This would do much to propagandize in favor of our much-vaunted "freedom-for-all" program in a attempt to ally the distrust in the breasts of many foreign nations.

Why, Oh why should every other race or nationality be treated with equality and dignity in preference to our own American Negro who has always been loyal to our Southern land? The answer is the only word now possible: And until the white South and America in general are willing—big enough in heart—to rid themselves of this gigantic evil, there can not be peace among races at home nor abroad, regardless of the amount of window-dressing that is paraded before foreigners as they visit us.

These young people could see the countless thousands of Negroes over the South and understand
