2 Ask Press Leadership On Civil Rights And Integration

PHILADELPHIA (AN) — Press leadership in strengthening civil rights and integration was urged by two speakers at different meetings held in Philadelphia recently.

At one, a luncheon sponsored by the Magazine Publishers Association in the Pierre hotel, Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas called on the press and educators, to provide leadership in strengthening civil rights. He said he was shocked at results of polls indicating that many Americans do not accept all of the provisions of the Bill of Rights.

The polls disclosed that less than two per cent of persons interviewed agreed with all the provisions of the Bill of

Rights.

"Once we give up piece by piece a little of the First amendment, a bit of the Fourth and some of the Fifth, and so on, we start down the totalitarian path," the justice declared.

At the awards dinner during the 20th annual meeting of the National Newspaper Publishers Association in the Franklin hotel, L. Alex Wilson, editor-general manager, Tri-State Defender, Memphis, had a similar line of reasoning, but directed toward the Negro press.

He told delegates representing more than 40 Negro publications,

that "The Negro press should re-develop its approach to current integration problems and dramatize the campaign for racial equality."

He attacked the "gradualistic approach" to integration, as advocated by some, and called for "more unity in anti-segregation feeling by the Negro race."

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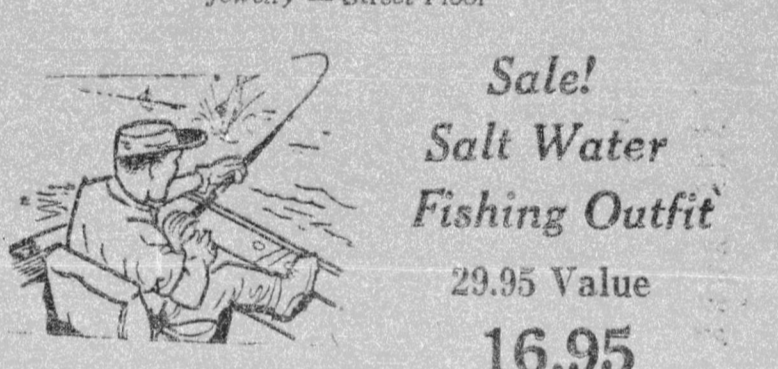


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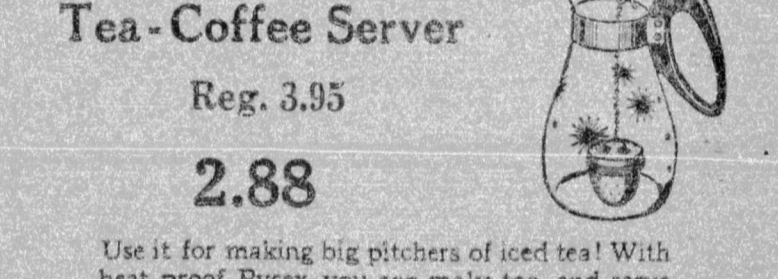

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Confesses Murdering A Teenager

GASTONIA—Gaston County rural police reported Friday that a 51-year-old man had confessed to the Saturday night slaying of a teenager in an argument over a woman.

Detective Ed Groves said Ervin Meeks, father of 11 children, has been charged with murder in the slaying of John Agar Crosby, 19, of Clover, S. C.

Meeks' confession came about two hours after officers had released him following lengthy questioning. He was taken into custody originally about four hours after Crosby's body was discovered Wednesday.

The accused had been in jail here until Friday morning when he was first released for lack of evidence. But after his release Groves received an anonymous telephone call linking Meeks to the death.

When questioned again, Meeks readily admitted killing Crosby with two blows with a wrench on the back of his head according to Groves.

The man claimed he acted in self-defense in the argument. The detective quoted Meeks as saying Crosby had attempted to attack him with an axe.

Appeals Court Okays Bias Housing Plan; NAACP Balks

ATLANTA (ANP)—The U. S. district court of appeals last week ruled that a Savannah, Ga., Negro woman was not entitled to an apartment in the Fred Wessels Homes, a white public housing unit.

In passing the ruling, the appellate court, sitting in New Orleans, upheld the decision of U. S. district Judge Frank M. Scarlett.

The opinion, written by Judge Richard Rives, said "there is certainly no law" to prevent voluntary racial segregation. He said there was no proof that the woman, Queen Cohen, "actually desired to become a tenant in that public housing project."

Scarlett had ruled that she had not made application for an apartment in the project and was not entitled to preference as she had not been displaced from the project site.

APPROVED PRINCIPLE

The appeals court, apparently recognizing the case as a test action sponsored by the NAACP said that "in both pleadings and the proof, governmentally enforced segregation is denied."

Georgia's Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook said "it was the first time to my recollection that the courts have approved the principle of voluntary segregation."

NAACP leader A. T. Walden, attorney for the plaintiff said the decision probably will be appealed to the U. S. Supreme court.

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
