Building Requests For A&T Includes Another Gym

GREENSBORO — A&T College last week make a request for a second gymnasium. The proposed new structure to seat approximately 5,000 spectators for basketball and to house instructional facilities for male physical education majors, is expected to cost over \$617,000. The building is one of five new structures requested last week as members of the North Carolina Advisory Budget Commission made a visit to the

campus to get a first hand report on the needs in permanent improvements. Included also in the requests presented by Dr. Warmuth T. Gibbs, president of the college, were: a chemistry building annex, \$463,600; fine arts and music building, \$218,000; agricultural engineering building, \$53,000; athletic field house, \$58,500 and miscellaneous campus improvements amounting to approximately \$20,000.

NEW YORK (ANP) — The National Scholarship Service and Fund for Negro Students has granted the first supplementary scholarship award from the American Conscience Fund to Ernest Green, first Negro graduate from Central High School in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Similar awards totaling about \$17,000 were made available this year to outstanding Negro high school seniors. John U. Monro, chairman of the Trustees of the Supplementary Scholarship Fund of NSSFNS said this week:

"These awards," Mr. Monro said, "are going to students from 21 states including 11 in the south."
