## Sunday School Lesson

By DR. G. F. MADKINS  
Presiding Elder, Sanford District, Central North Carolina Conference, A.M.E. Zion Church

Sunday, July 26  
SUBJECT: JUSTICE IN THE FAMILY  
LESSON TEXT: Proverbs 6:20-23; Mark 10:13-16; Ephesians 5:21-31; 6:1-4; I Timothy 5:8.

**MEMORY VERSE:** Be ye kind one to another, Ephesians 4:32. **THE LESSON IN ITS SETTING.** TIME—The laws of Leviticus were given about 1420 B.C. The Proverbs were written about 950 B.C. Christ's words concerning divorce and children were uttered in February, A.D. 30, and the two letters of the Apostle Paul were written about A.D. 65.

**PLACE:**—The words of our Lord taken from Mark were spoken in Perea. Ephus was a large city in Asia Minor. Paul was a prisoner in Rome when he wrote his letters to Timothy.

**THE PLAN OF THE LESSON**  
The plan for this Sunday's lesson includes the factors which combine to make the ideal home which God has purposed for men. I. The honor due our elders, Leviticus 19:32.

II. The wisdom of hearkening to parental instruction, Proverbs 6:20-23.

III. Jesus' teaching regarding divorce, Mark 10:2-12.

IV. Children in the teaching of Jesus, Mark 10:13-16.

V. The ideal Christian family, Ephesians 5:21-6:4.

Under this heading should be a discussion of the relationship between husband and wife, the obligation of children toward their parents, and the obligation of parents toward their children.

VI. The husband must provide for his own household, I Timothy 5:8.

**THEME OF LESSON**  
Herein the lesson the idea is set forth that the submission of the wife to her husband is merely that voluntary submission of one Christian to another which regards the family as a divine institution wherein the husband has the responsibility of leadership, of support, of protection, and of loving care.

In the Christian family each member — father, mother, and children — respects the rights of the others. By divine guidance, parents are obligated to teach their children the right way to live as in the fear and admonition of

God. It is the obligation of children to respect their parents by obedience to them. It is implied that parents do not deserve this respect if they live ungodly lives. Children are to honor and obey their parents. There will come a time when children can no longer carry out such admonitions, for one reason: their parents will be gone, and it will be too late. But reverence and loving respect can be the attitude of all of us to our parents as long as they are living.

On the other hand, parents deserve the respect and obedience pointed in verses of today's lesson — providing their own lives and words of wisdom conform to the laws of God.
