

### **Church Bonus Money Rules**

All purchase slips or receipts presented to your church must come from stores advertising in the CAROLIMAN

Each week carries a date in the Bonus Money period. Purchases eligible must come from the store during the week the "ad" appears.

No purchase slips representing a business should be submitted. All receipts must come from individual purchases.

All churches in Raleigh and Wake County are eligible.

All purchase slips must bear the name of the store from which the ourchase was made.
