

# "I'm Happy About My Reception In Britain," Says Harry Belafonte

LONDON, England (AP)—"Hello, Ron, meet your son." These were the words with which I was greeted by Harry Belafonte when he opened the door of his hotel suite to me this morning.

As I walked in, Harry said to me, "Oh, man, my throat—". After inquiring what was the matter and hoping it wouldn't affect him seriously, I was assured it wouldn't, and that his work was not the cause of his laryngitis but the amount of talking he is forced to do in the daytime. Yet in his eagerness he never stopped talking.

We talked about everything but not very much about the man Harry Belafonte, who is Britain's current heart-throb. The people here just love him.

Harry feels very strongly about the place of the Negro in the world today. He sees all that is wrong, and is very pleased that

great progress is being made and wishes that the day will not be far distant when colored people throughout the world will be regarded with the dignity that is their birthright.

## Dr. Caliver To Keynote A&T Faculty-Staff Meet

GREENSBORO — A prominent government official in education will keynote the annual Pre-Session Faculty-Staff Orientation Conference at A&T College, September 6-7.

Dr. Arlrose Caliver, chief, Adult Section, Office of Education, U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Washington, D. C. will speak to 400 groups on Monday, September 8.

A native of Virginia, he is a graduate of Knoxville College and holds the Master's degree from the University of Wisconsin and the Doctorate degree from Columbia University. He entered the U. S. Department of Education in 1930, and was elevated to his present post in 1950.

Following the address a series of smaller group conferences will be conducted along the theme of the conference, "By What Means May A&T College perform Most Effectively Its Primary Functions: Instruction, Research and Public Ser-

vice."

The conference gets underway early Saturday with the annual message by Dr. Wainwright T. Gibbs, president of the college. The Saturday program also calls for a tour of the campus facilities and the city for new faculty and staff members and a Get-Acquainted Social that evening.

The President's Dinner, honoring the group, will be held in Murphy Hall on Sunday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock.

The conference draws to a close on Tuesday afternoon following meetings of the faculties of the several Schools.

—Dr. Marjorie Hollman Parker, associate professor of education at District of Columbia Teachers College, recently was elected national president of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, the nation's oldest and largest social Greek-letter organization for Negro women. Dr. Parker will assume leadership of the 20,000-member group immediately, and serve through August, 1961. She succeeds Mrs. Arnetta G. Wallace of Chicago, who had headed the organization since 1954.

# Unless Governor Or Court Intervenes, Man Will Die In Hot Seat For \$1.95 Robbery; Stirs Up Big Controversy

MONTGOMERY (AP)—Unless the state Supreme court or the governor of Alabama intervenes, a 35-year-old Negro will die in the electric chair for a \$1.95 robbery.

The farmhand is scheduled to die Sept. 5, but this date would be postponed if the case does not reach the court of appeals before then. The high court, which automatically reviews every capital case is not expected to rule on the case that has stirred up an international controversy" until next week.

Jimmy Walker, the Negro, was convicted for the robbery of Mrs. Estelle Barker at Marion, Ala., July 27, 1957. Under state law nighttime robbery of an inhabited dwelling is punishable by death.

In a lower court, the woman testified that Wilson also "attempted" to rape her, but he was not tried on that charge.

Court upheld the death sentence. Despite the high court's action on a new appeal Governor Folsom could step in and commute the sentence.

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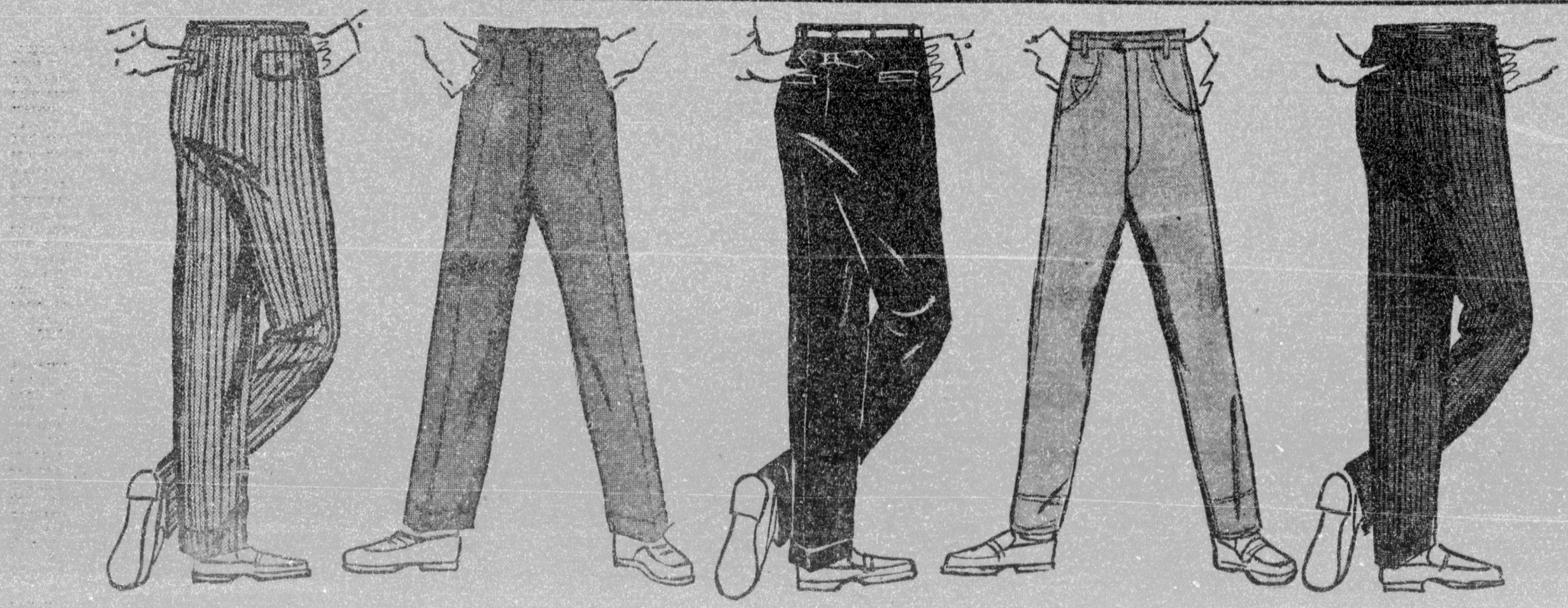


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
