"STAND UP LIKE A MAN" COSTEN

ROCKY MOUNT, N. C. — "And he said unto me, Son of man, stand upon thy feet, and I will speak with thee." Subject: "Stand Up Like a Man". This was the text and sermon theme of the Rev. J. H. Costen at Mt. Pisgah Presbyterian Church Sunday when he preached from Ezekiel 2 chapter, 1 verse.

Said the popular young minister who is making quite an impression in Eastern Tarheelia: "There is something about standing on one's own feet. It gives that dignity that nothing else seems to give." Discouraging on how the world is in dire need of men and women who are willing to face the vital moral issues of this era, Mr. Costen said, "Self-respect is the reason or quonion of life itself. How so many weak people get into the church and condemn others who stand for something is a mystery because God has always called for courageous leaders to work for him."

The native Omahian who has been here two years, added, "The greatest weakness of our time is the lack of convictions on the moral issues facing the world today."

Costen exhorted his congregation "Stand up Little Rock. Stand up Daisy Bates, and may there be more to stand with you: Stand up all America. Asia and Africa, and hear the voice of God saying, 'Let My People Go!'"
