

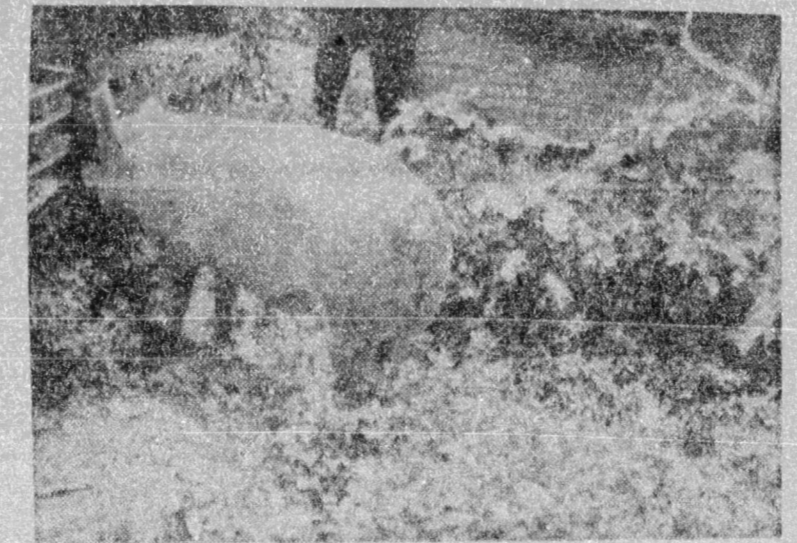

**FAISONS GRADE TOBACCO**—This is Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Faison, daughters Barbara Gail and Peggy, and Patricia Jacobs grading tobacco on the farm of Mr. G. C. Jacobs, Sampson County. Mr. Jacobs is one of Sampson County's most prosperous farmers and one who does not believe in putting all of his eggs in one basket. Mr. Jacobs cultivates tobacco, citrus, string beans, pepper, cucumbers, white potatoes, corn and the family garden. Along with the crops, Jacobs carries three brood sows that farrow twice yearly, 41-42 pigs per farrow. Then several rows are sold each year. These animals feed principally on pasture. Mr. Jacobs broods 100 birds per year, kills the roosters and culls the pullets down to about 35 to 40 for family egg supply and sells the surplus. The roosters and cull pullets go in the freezer, with a cow, pig, vegetables and fruits for the family's year round food supply.

**WE GOTTA FIGHT AND PAY FOR RIGHTS**

**ROCKY MOUNT — CORRECTION:** Last week's HOPPING ABOUT TARHEELIA column carried Teachers College, B.S. and Columbia a commentary on Raleigh's popular radio personality Carl Goerch's recent broadcast in which he blamed the large colored population in Tarheelia for the low per capita income of the State's citizens as compared with the New England States.

We called attention to the fact that Mr. Goerch did not mention that the Negroer of the OldNorth State — as well as elsewhere in the South — are systematically excluded from almost all the textile, utilities and business jobs; and with the dwindling agricultural and domestic employment the Negro could do little to enhance per capita income because of his frightful unemployment rate.

We also called upon Mr. Goerch to use his influence to urge the leaders grant fair employment opportunity to Negroes so as to increase the State's income and reduce crime brought on by poverty and idleness.

We concluded by saying: "On

this same point, Gov. Luther Hodges has expressed much concern about the State's low income. We have NOT observed that Gov. Hodges has come out directly blaming Negroes for the low per capita income.

The word "not" in reference to Governor was left out of the published item thru an error in printing. We regret the error.

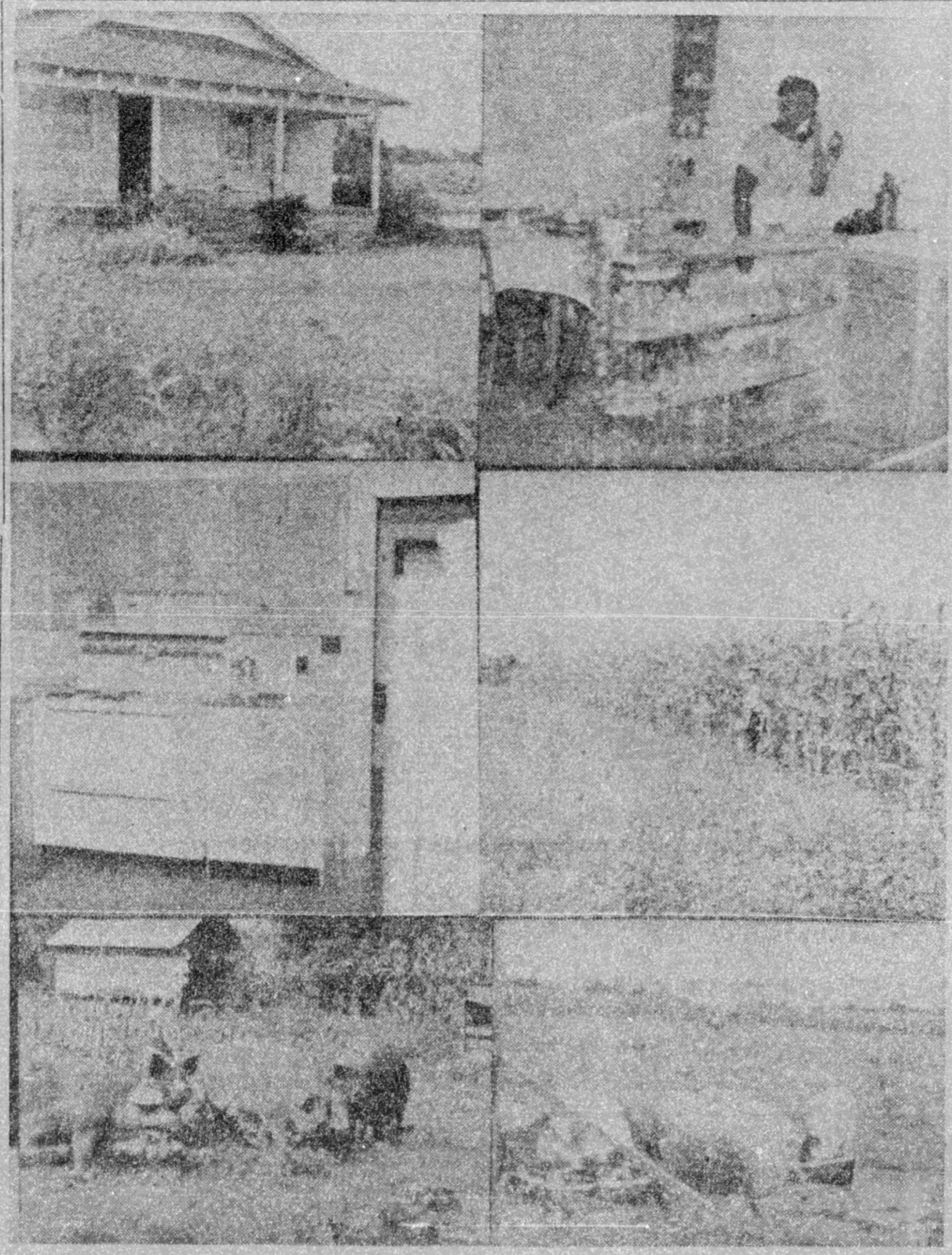
**N. C. NAACP OCTOBER 3-12**  
Word has gone out from the office of N. C. NAACP field secretary Charles A. McLean, 1433 Hattie Avenue, Winston-Salem, that the Annual State Conference of NAACP will be held in Raleigh October 3-12 at Martin Street Baptist Church.

The State Staff in cooperation with the National NAACP office is redoubling efforts to increase the membership of all local branches and college chapters in order to show a net gain over 1957 when the national membership declined some 35 thousand while the finances increased.

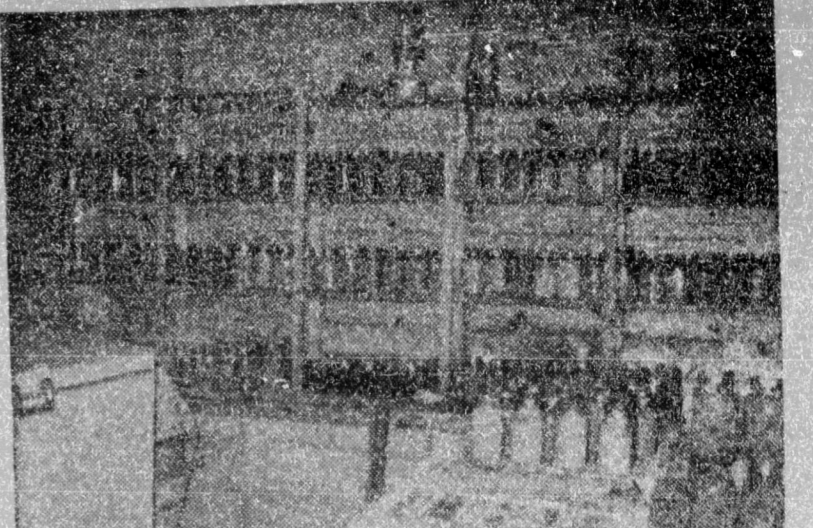

**'57 "FARM FAMILY OF YEAR"** — Mr. and Mrs. Robert Atkinson and son Irdell were honored in 1957 as North Carolina's "Farm Family of the Year." They represented Sampson County at the Annual District Federation in November. The Atkinsons work cooperatively with the Extension Program in carrying out recommended practices on the aging phone in her kitchen. Crops cultivated are farm and in the home. Mrs. Atkinson is shown tobacco, cotton, corn, pepper and cucumbers. All crops are fertilized by soil test, so they secure maximum yields with least cost. With the exception of tobacco, these other crop yields are nearly triple the county average. Mr. and Mrs. Atkinson are good year-round gardeners and food conservators. They do not believe in buying so much food and feeds that can be produced. Atkinson maintains four brood sows, that farrow twice yearly, dropping 19-22 pigs per sow. These pigs he sells asoppers, delivering him a nice fat check that you may call an extra check each spring and fall. For home use Atkinson kills seven pigs each year. These are his seven chicks for this year. A cross of Poland China and Berkshire in the background is the family pig. The sow has been leading to a 150 lb. pig in 150 days. This pig is a 10 acre field of corn that is expected to yield 30 to 40 bushels of corn per acre. This corn was fertilized with 400 pounds of 5-10-10 fertilizer and 80 pounds of liquid nitrogen.
