

Open To Negroes:

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The Catholic Church has an ever-increasing membership in this country, and it has a scholarship fund designed to give help to Negro members of the church. This fund assist in paying the tuition of worthy young Catholics who are interested in furthering their education.

High school seniors who are interested in one of these scholarships should write Mrs. K. J. L. Pagan, Catholic Scholarship Fund for Negro Students, Inc., 254 Union St., Springfield, Massachusetts. Usually these scholarships are good for four years.

LOANS AND GRANTS under an education act passed by the Eighty-fifth Congress may be available for the second semester of the present school year. It is expected that the program will get underway soon. College students who are inter-

ested in one of the Federal scholarships should make application through the college or university he attends or plans to attend.

The scholarships are in the form of loans which the student repays after he graduates from college. No student can borrow more than \$1,000 in any one year or more than a total of \$5,000 for his entire college career. The scholarship loans will carry a 3 per cent interest rate.

Students who are interested in one of these Federal scholarship loans should seek information from the Guidance and Counseling Services of the high school or college they are attending.

Opportunities in certain fields are open to persons who are adequately prepared; and the best way to get prepared is to attend some college, university, or technical institute. This source of monies to assist students in school should be investigated by every interested Negro student.

Elizabeth City College Begins Sixty-Sixth Yr.

ELIZABETH CITY — The Sixty-sixth academic year of Elizabeth City State Teachers College officially opened last week with a series of professional conferences during which the staff discussed and prepared for "The Improvement of Instruction." The conference was presided over by Dr. Walter N. Ridley, upon assuming duties September 1, announced that Dr. Williams' services had been retained as a consultant to the president for a month. About October 1, President and Mrs. Williams will assume their residence in Jamaica, New York.

TECHNICAL INSTITUTE OPERATING
The recently established technical institute at the college offers limited term trades in four new areas of job preparation. Enrollment in the technical institute will be Friday, September 19.

Robinson, house director of Hugh Cole Hall, formerly of Fayetteville State Teachers College.

HIGHLIGHTS OF ORIENTATION
With the arrival of new students, the orientation program included a dinner held by President and Mrs. Ridley in Lane Hall Dining Room for faculty families. Former President and Mrs. S. D. Williams were honored guests at this dinner. A faculty reception was held for new students in Dole's Hall, the senior women's residence.

Other activities included entrance examinations, a campus tour, health examinations, orientation activities. Freshman Talent Night was held on Friday evening, September 12, and revealed the presence of much talent in the freshman class which is the largest in the past several years. Orientation activities closed with the traditional Candlelighting Service of worship, meditation, and induction with all new students participating on Sunday, September 14 in the college auditorium.

Parents, friends from the community and returning students saw new students light their candles from candles originally lighted by the faculty to symbolize the beginning of their increase in knowledge during their college careers.

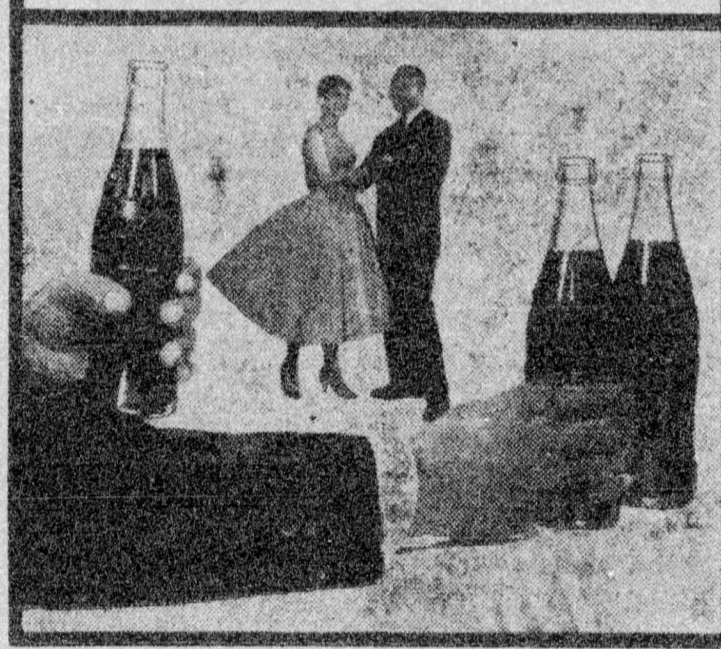

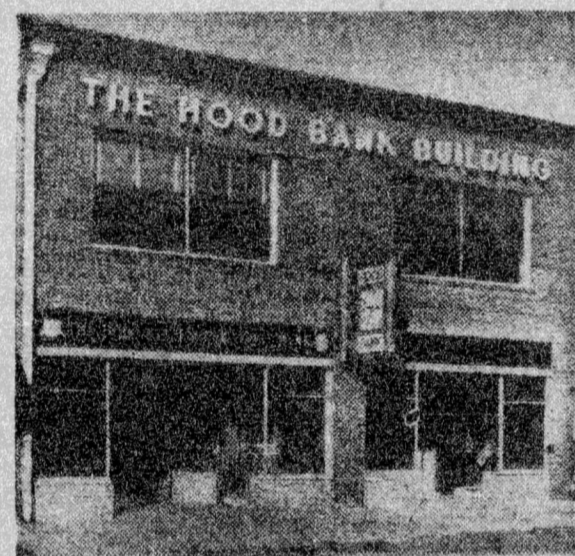

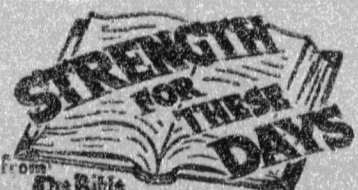
Va. State's Opening Set For Friday

University, Tallahassee, Fla., will deliver the main address. Miss Afrika E. Hayes, soprano; Mr. Donald E. Barret, piano and Mr. William L. Griggsby, baritone, all members of the music faculty, will be at the organ.

The exercises will be presided over by Dr. J. H. Johnson, vice president of Virginia State College. Dr. J. M. Hunter, dean of the college, will make announcements and Dr. Robert P. Daniel, college president, will introduce the speaker.

Dr. Gore received his education at the DePauw University, Howard University and Columbia University. He was dean and director of the Graduate School of Tennessee A. and I.
