## Sunday School Lesson

**LESSON IV—OCTOBER 26**  
The subject of this week's lesson is "Victory in Temptation" based upon Matthew 4:1-11.

Memory Verse: "For in that he himself hath suffered being tempted he is able to succor them that are tempted." Hebrews 2:18.

**LESSON SETTING**  
Time—The reading of A. D. 27. Place—A wilderness, probably though its location is not definitely known.

**LESSON PLAN**  
I The attending circumstances, — Matthew 4:1, 2.  
II The three temptations themselves. — Matthew 4:3-10.  
III The events immediately following the third temptation. — Matthew 4:11.

**LESSON DISCUSSION**  
Temptation may be either sensuous, imaginative, or rational. For example, a man may be tempted through the senses, then it appeals to greed, appetite, lust, or any of the passions that beset mankind and create our grosser miseries or crime. . . . If through the imagination, then it dazzles to betray, becomes as pride, ambition, or any one of the graceful gracious forms that can be made to veil, vainlorious, through protean, egotism. If through reason, then it comes as doubts of the true, suspicion of the good, or in any of the many forms in which intellect protests against the limit it so wishes, and yet is so little able to transcend. Temptation may thus assume shapes akin to the highest as to the lowest in man, but the forms most distinct often subtle meet and blend.

Then Jesus was led up of the Spirit. This expression tells us that God has a purpose in allowing temptation which will come. The Devil's design is to wreck one's life and to wreck the purpose of God in ad through men.

We should bear in mind that our Lord's temptation occurred immediately after the hour when He was officially anointed by the Holy Spirit to undertake His great Messianic ministry. Before this time there were no miracles; but following the temptations, Jesus begins to perform His miracles.

The first temptation came in the form of an appeal to turn stones into bread. Jesus is tempted to satisfy his hunger in such a way as to prove that He is the Son of God. Our bodily appetites often form the occasion of many of our severest temptations. These appetites are

not sins in themselves, but the sin consists in seeking improper gratification of them.

In the second temptation the devil asked Jesus to win the approval of the public by casting Himself down from the pinnacle of the tower. He pictured for Christ the great acclaim He would get from the applause of the crowds who would observe the miracle.

Jesus saw the trickery of the devil. By bowing down, He would submit to the one before whom he threw Himself prostrate. For Jesus to have bowed down to the devil would have meant a recognition of the devil's power. To the devil's disappointment, Jesus overcame all three temptations.

**A LESSON TRUTH**  
God has not so arranged the lives of His children that they should not have any temptations and so-called evils, but He has made abundant provision for victory over temptations, primarily in three ways; by the sword of the Spirit, His Word; by the example of Christ; and by the indwelling and power of the Holy Spirit. We must remember the words of the Apostle Paul as found in Romans, "in all these things we are more than conqueror through him that loved us."
