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Powell Comments On Police Gambling In Washington, DC

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Commenting on recently published reports concerning involvement of Washington D. C. policemen in organized gambling, Representative Adam Clayton Powell of New York, recently issued a statement asking for greater public concern over crime and corruption in the nation's capital.

The New York Congressman, himself a Baptist clergyman, a pastor of Harlem's Abyssinian Church, indicated that he would seek to call a meeting of inter-denominational ministers in the District of Columbia to study the situation there, and to make plans for a crusade to elevate Washington community standards. The problem Mr. Powell stated was mainly one of public apathy and indifference, plus the failure of the responsible public officials to cooperate.

"The proposed conference, Powell said, would study the feasibility of a Congressional probe into Washington's crime situation. It would also analyze the degree to which crime statistics are being misused by anti-integration forces."

TEXT OF POWELL'S STATEMENT FOLLOWS:
My attention was directed to a situation in Washington, D. C. which, to put it mildly, deserves the attention of every responsible citizen. Crime and civic corruption

are flourishing in the Nation's capital to an alarming degree, and as often as not the involvement of Negroes has given to the situation a potentially dangerous racial twist.

Recently published news stories suggesting possible collusion between law-breakers and those responsible for the enforcement of laws, are shocking examples of a moral sickness to which all of us should direct our attention. Since one of the major concerns of today's metropolitan clergy is the apparent weakening of moral fibre, particularly among our young people, the Washington, D. C. situation should command the immediate attention of all inter-denominational and inter-faith organizations. The responsible Federal authorities should pledge cooperation.

At the earliest possible moment after consulting with my colleagues of several denominations in Washington, I will suggest the convening of a group to give the matter careful study and consideration. I will offer them my assistance in urging the responsible governmental authorities to crack down on gambling, vice and above all, Police Department involvement with numbers.

Since the high incidence of crime and arrests in Washington, D. C. has been misused to reflect discredit on Negroes,

and to substantiate false charges of the anti-integration forces; the clergy of Washington should also consider some means of counteracting these libelous charges.

I believe that for the most part the police and government officials vested with District affairs are honest and dedicated men. We do know, however, that so-called Southern attitudes on racial matters may be the root cause of the District Commission's failure to come to grips with a grave situation.

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NCNW To Display & Dramatize The Story Of Women

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The story of Negro women in America—past and present—will be featured at an international festival when the National Council of Negro Women displays and dramatizes its composition and activities at the Women's International Exposition in New York City Nov. 3-9.

Exhibited in a ten-foot-square booth under the theme "The National Council of Negro Women at Work" will be the educational and cultural contributions of the 22 national organization affiliates of the 117 constituent groups of NCNW.

Prominent among the display items will be a collection of photographs on NCNW community leadership activities in health, education, scholarship, citizenship and international relations.

Another prominent feature will be the interval showings of a 35 mm. color film strip, "Women, United," which tells the NCNW story, showing its composition and detailing its community service activities. Technically produced by Ebony magazine as a public service in cooperation with NCNW.

The film strip urges women in all walks of life to close ranks and join hands with unity of purpose for unity of action.

Included also will be doll replicas made by Meta Warwick Fuller of such famous Negro women as Sojourner Truth, anti-slavery leader; Harriett Tubman, Civil War underground leader; Julia Terriotte, late dean of women at Fisk University and interracial leader; Mary Church Terrell, late integration leader; Lucy Diggs Slowe, late dean of women at Howard University and a women's organizer; Phyllis Wheatly, anti-slavery leader and writer and NCNW founder Mary McLeod Bethune.

The collection and a tapestry quilt to be exhibited were taken from a collection assembled by NCNW's archives and museum department.

FAMOUS NEGROES' RECIPES
The Exposition will mark the launching site for a new historical cook book which gives favorite recipes of famous Negro leaders. The book was compiled and edited by Mrs. Sue Baily Thurman, chairman of NCNW's archives and museum department.

During each evening of the Exposition the heads of national organizations forming NCNW will be special guests of honor at the Council's booth.

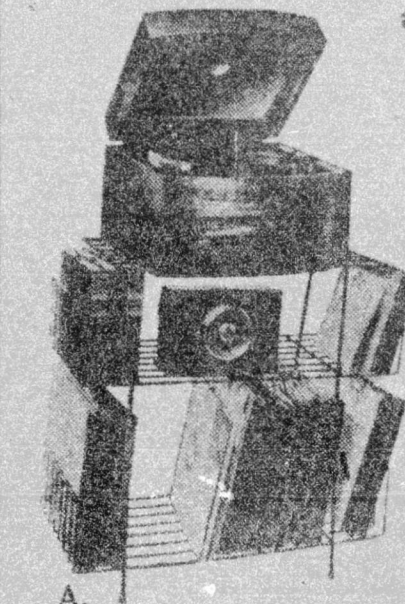
Sponsored by the National Women's Institute, the 25th Annual Women's International Exposition will be held at the 71st Armory, Park Avenue and 34th Street.

An estimated 75 per cent of the North Carolina cotton crop will be classified this year by the State Classing Office.

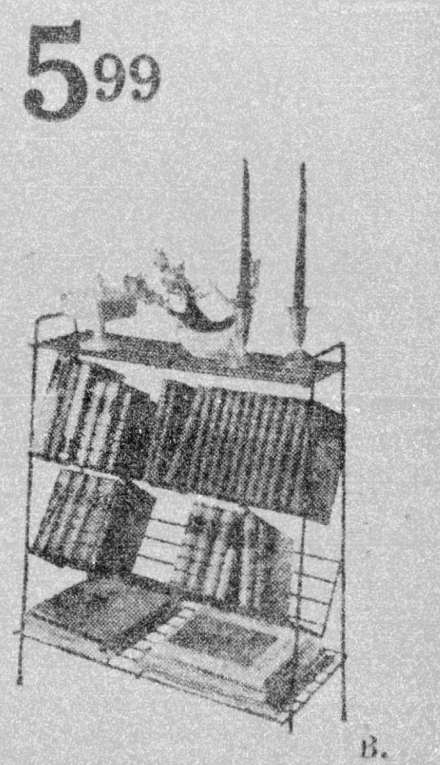

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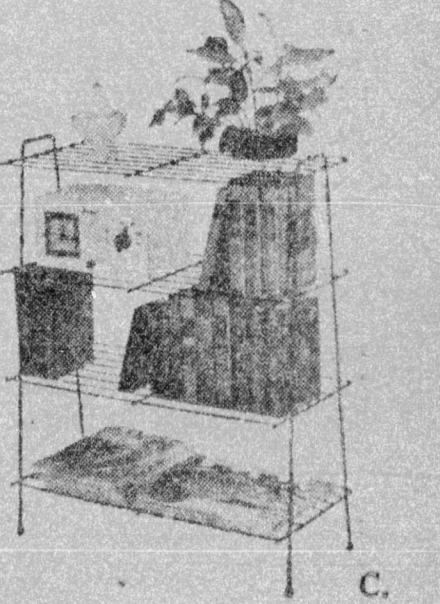
A. Band Stand

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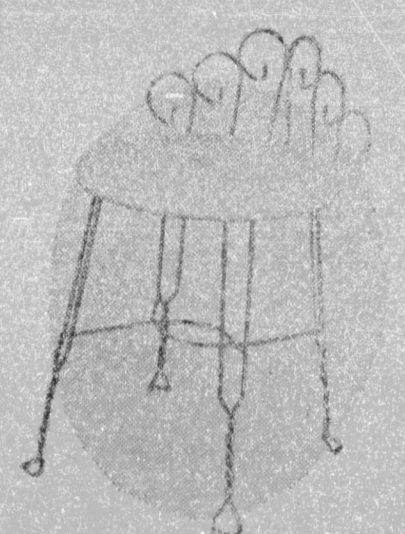
B. Room Divider
