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Sunday School Lesson BY REV. CLYDE B. WALTON

Nov. 16, Jesus' Healing Ministry. Matt. 8:1-17; Mark 1:29-34; printed text, Matt. 8:5-17. Approach to the lesson: The Lord Jesus is the Great Physician. His restorative arms are extended by Him. And He heals bodies afflicted by illness.

The miracles of healing He performed reveal His divine identity, exhibit His mighty power, and demonstrate His compassionate love.

Christ was crucified as King at His baptism. He announced His mission as the Son of God. He presented His credentials as the sovereign ruler over demons and disease. No diabolical force could oppose His command; He drove out evil spirits with a word. Suffering and sickness yielded to His will.

Every miracle proved beyond a doubt that the King was indeed the Son of God. But more, the series of astounding acts showed that Christ's power was absolute. Even foul and loathsome leprosy, one of the most hideous and disgusting forms of disease, was cleansed when the Master spoke. Even the distance that separated the Saviour from the afflicted centurion's servant was conquered by the omniscient voice of the Lord.

The miracles, moreover, have a message of tenderness and cheer for the God's people. They proclaim the love of the Saviour for those in need. He entered into the plight of those He helped. The Bible does not teach that divine healing is in the attainment wrought by Christ. His miracles were not a theological necessity, but the result of His grace and mercy. He is deeply and personally concerned about the trials of His own.

The Heart of the Lesson Three important truths stand out in sharp relief in this lesson. 1. Our Lord's miraculous acts were not coincidental. They were an integral aspect of His career on earth. The prophet Isaiah, writing in the eighth century before Christ, predicted that the coming Messiah would have a ministry of physical healing. Man's infirmities and sicknesses would arouse His compassion and arouse His aid. Matt. 8:17 and Luke 4:17, 18.

2. The particular miracles described in the passage are all unusual. They reveal the many-sidedness of the Saviour's interest and helpfulness. To begin with, a leper crossed the stage. So horrible was he deemed to cry out, "Unclean," and thus proclaim his heart-rending plight, whoever touched him was contaminated. Yet when the Lord made contact with the poor creature He was not polluted. Instead, physical health streamed into the leper's debilitated body.

Then a Gentile appealed to Christ for aid. Some opinionated Hebrews might have regarded the centurion as nationally without the pale. Yet our Lord's love reached beyond ethnic barriers and the servant was healed. Peter's mother-in-law, who would have dreamed stoops to meet the physical needs of a feverish woman? Yet that is what He did.

Finally, "All that were sick" (Matt. 8:16) crowded the entrance of Simon's Capernaum home. Would the Lord Jesus then the money host away? Never. He lovingly stretched forth His hand to heal. Stun He in. Divine power and love will descend to the depths to succor those in need, will cross national frontiers, disregard privileges reserved for one sex, and eliminate man-made distinction of caste or condition when affliction knocks at the Saviour's door.

3. The conditions of healing is faith. The leper believed that Christ could heal, and he hoped that He would. Matt. 8:2. The centurion was confident that the Lord's word, even though spoken from afar, would be effective. Matt. 8:8. Such vital and assured trust was swiftly and beneficently rewarded.

Golden Text Matt. 9:35 - "... teaching... and healing every sickness and every disease among the people." This is a summary of Christ's prophetic ministry. He taught that people might turn to God, and healed that people might appreciate His gracious concern for their needs.
