The purposes of the conference were: 1. To explore development and progress in meeting the needs of exceptional children; 2. Evaluate services provided atypical children; 3. Discover through workshop experiences, better methods and procedures for instruction; and 4. Look to the future for expected growth to meet all atypical needs.

"Speech Problems of the Space Age" was the topic of the panel held. Outstanding speakers included Hubert D. Ellis, Speech Therapist of Raleigh City Schools.

Mr. Ellis began his speech by defining communication according to Webster.

Webster defines communication as "the ability to make one idea the property of two or more persons." acceptance of that definition could revolutionize the teaching of English by putting the sharing of ideas at the heart of the program and assigning skills to a contributory position, where they belong.

"Language power is not something in the back of one's head which he can remember if he thinks long enough; it is the ability to think and to act in the right way at the right moment and is developed only through a long series of experiences in trying to act in the appropriate way in a similar situation."

The miracle of shared living through the use of words can come about only when we achieve singleness of meanings through precision of expression. Communication involves both impression and expression. Critical examination of what is heard or read is as important as precision and intensity in one's own use of language. One of the most crucial elements in the situation is freedom of speech; for freedom of speech gives equal rights to the straight and the crooked-thinker, to the loyal citizen and to the man of malicious intent.

Devotion to truth learned through careful examination of ideas, is the aim of the teaching of communication in a democracy. Use of stilted or emotional language, fallacies, reasoning, stereotyped or prejudiced thinking, and substitution of the devices of propaganda for clear presentation of evidence must be recognized for what they are.

A social setting, then, involving other people and a purpose for speaking and writing are essential to the growth in power in communication. Increasingly, teachers of the language arts are focusing their program on the normal activities of life in school, at home, and in the community. Real purposes for speaking and writing grow out of the activities in progress in the classroom, and the need for improvement becomes obvious as children succeed or fail in their undertakings because of the lack of mastery of the skills involved.

Something to say, a valid reason for saying it, and the necessary technical equipment for saying it well are three vital factors in the improvement of speech and writing. Situations such as those just mentioned afford all three.

Clarity of thinking as a means of bringing order out of ill-defined and scattered ideas and effective expression in communicating them to others—these are the processes which must receive attention first in teaching the skills of communication. Personal integrity in assuming responsibility for what one says and care in backing up one's ideas with evidence are matters of primary importance.

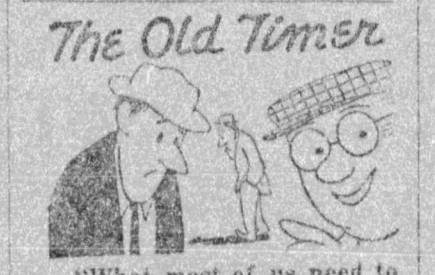
