NAACP Reports On Prejudice

LOS ANGELES — The Policy Committee of the West Coast Re-gion National Association For The Advancement of Colored People, this week issued the following statement:

The NAACP is entering its 50th year in the struggle to se-cure the blessings of democ-racy to all. More than ever before it is incumbent upon of-fice holders in both our state and nation to contribute to the strengthening of our democra-tic structure and our national security through affirmative action to outlaw invidious ra-cial and religious discrimina-tion which undermines that se-curity.

"With this in mind, the Policy Committee of the Western Region of the NAACP, which includes California, have adopted the fol-lowing policy statement concern-ing proposed legislative action de-signed to accomplish this end by our California office holders.

STATE LEGISLATION
"California, the second state in the union, has lagged far behind the industrial states of New York, New Jersey, Michigan, Massa-chusetts, Wisconsin and Connecti-cut; behind the western states of Colorado and New Mexico and be-hind its sister Pacific Coast states of Oregon and Washington in the area of fair employment legisla-tion. Those states, and a half doz-en others, have enacted laws pro-hibiting discrimination in employ-ment, by employers, by unions and by employment agencies.

"California has been similar-ly remiss in forbidding dis-crimination in publicly assist-ed housing and in urban re-development. New York, New Jersey, Connecticut and other eastern and mid-western states have acted in this field and, a-gain, Oregon and Washington have taken the lead on the West Coast.

"California has permitted tax exempt educational institutions to discriminate on racial, religious and national grounds, again in distinction to action taken by other states. Insurance companies discriminate against Negro ap-plicants, particularly in the field of public liability and property dam-age insurance, virtually required by existing statutes.

"California's misconception on law declared unconstitutional by the State Supreme Court, remains on our statute books as an ugly re-minder of a discriminatory past. In some instances, California courts have interpreted state civil rights acts to tolerate discrimina-tion by cemeteries, by private schools and by professional men, to mention a few instances.

NEW YORK (AP) — Richard Diggs, 42, is not one to let bygones be bygones, judging by his action in firing four shots at Julius Weir, 55, manager of a Harlem tavern. Fortunately, Diggs' aim was not good and Weir was only wounded slightly in the left arm.

According to police, Diggs was seeking vengeance on Weir for the latter's shooting of him last New Year's Day.

REBDED SIX MONTHS

Diggs had just been released from a hospital bed where he spent six months recuperating from bullet wounds inflicted by Weir. The tavern manager had been out on bail, pending the dis-position of the case.
