Mich. Governor Calls Upon Demos To Fight Race Bias

NEW YORK (AP) — Governor G. Mennen Williams, Democratic, told 450 local Democrats at the Lexington Democratic Club that if the Democratic Party is to win the 1960 Presidential election, it must work to end all discrimination against minorities.

Also, Governor Williams contended, the party must advocate “elimination of discrimination in education, in housing, in public accommodations, in job opportunities.”

Governor Williams expressed an optimistic hope that “the day can come in America when discrimination is as rare as human slavery, which a century ago was tolerated by many honest and honorable Americans.”

The Michigan Governor pointed out that “if the party has a Governor Faubus in Arkansas, opposed to integration, it has also a Governor Raymond Gary, of neighbor-

ing Oklahoma, which peacefully integrated schools.”

Proper Foot Care:

The Tapered Road To Health

It's healthy to be stylish. That's the verdict of American podiatrists who have had ample opportunity to study the effects of the tapered toe on feminine foot health.

A recent nationwide survey of foot specialists by the American Foot Care Institute found evidence that well-fitted tapered shoes caused their patients no discomfort, fatigue or foot ailments.

Soft, supple leathers that adapt to the shape of the foot, allowing free movement of toes without stiffness or cramping, is the correct secret built into the new tapered style.

Dr. Benjamin Keith, prominent podiatrist and director of the American Foot Care Institute, noted also that the normal bone structure of the foot is well adapted to the tapered shoe. The longest bone, the second, counting from the big toe, stretches the full length and fits neatly into the toe of elongated

footwear. It is this toe which blunter fashions tend to cramp and curl—paving the way to a lifetime of nagging pain and complaint.

“As a nation we are better fed. Plenty of milk, vegetables and meat have added inches to our bone structure,” Dr. Keith pointed out. “I'm happy that women are no longer ashamed of their longer feet. Styles that face facts are sane.”

He added one note of caution, however: “The low-cut tapered pump is fine for dress wear. To carry a woman through activities, from household chores and shopping to cleaning up after dinner, foot experts still recommend an all-leather oxford with sturdy but uppers.”

But the finest of leathers and the most elegant of styles can only bring foot happiness when teamed with proper individualized fitting, Dr. Keith warned.

“A well-fitted shoe should be comfortable even as you rise for a first glimpse in the shop mirror,” he said. “Grandma's stiff high-button shoes might have needed ‘breaking-in,’ but not today's footwear molded to the true shape of the foot.”

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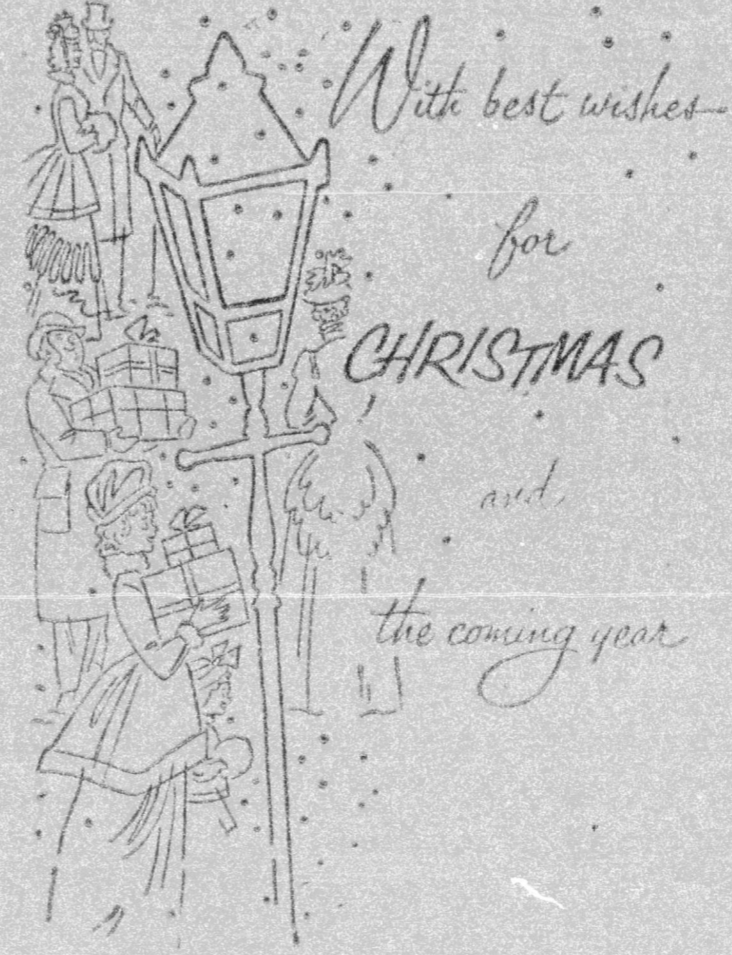
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
